Course Overview

To provide community safety, law enforcement leaders must utilize all available tools to increase their effectiveness. In recent years, crime analysis has been shown to provide the identification of crime patterns and trends within communities. In addition, these patterns have connected crime trends from various jurisdictions. With the use of operational crime data collection and analysis and mapping procedures, crime analysts can provide meaningful reports, identifying patterns and trends within specific areas as well as entire jurisdictions. With this information, leaders may develop and implement plans of action to reduce and prevent crime within communities. This provides community members with a feeling of safety. Reducing or preventing crime within communities also provides community members the security they need to report crime in the future. This cooperation between law enforcement and community members provides a strong defense against criminal activity from taking root within the community.

During the course, we will cover various ways of addressing criminal behavior using crime analysis. We will review the foundations of crime analysis, theories used to identify crime, and strategies developed based on evidence gathered by crime analysts. We will also examine various processes for collecting and processing data, creating crime maps that identify crime areas, and how the end result of crime analysis may help law enforcement leaders address the problem. There are three specific crime analysis reporting that we will investigate in detail—tactical, strategic, and administrative crime analysis techniques. Finally, we will look at the importance of accountability with law enforcement organizations. This course is designed to provide you with the skills needed to identify crime patterns and trends and present the findings to organizational leaders.

Unit 1 >> Foundations of Crime Analysis

Introduction

To fully appreciate the need for the crime analysis function, it is important to understand the origins of crime analysis and the methods used to collect crime data. It is also important to examine the role the crime analyst plays in deciphering the crime statistics and organizing it into meaningful data.

This unit will provide an introduction into the discipline of crime analysis and the profession of a crime analyst. It will provide an examination of what crime analysis is and how this relates to crime mapping; explore the history of crime analysis and crime mapping in United States; and explain the evolution of the role of crime analyst, which will cover the importance of the crime analyst in deciphering crime statistics gathered and using the data to target specific areas or targets of crime. This unit will also explore how crime analysis is approached on the international level.

The purpose of crime analysis is to provide a method of collecting meaningful data that includes not only crime but also policy and internal operations of the law enforcement organization. The ultimate goal of crime analysis is to assist law enforcement in apprehending criminals, reducing the incidents of crime, eliminating disorder, and implementing crime prevention procedures.

Crime mapping uses geographic information to connect crime from various locations within the law enforcement boundaries. The crime analyst uses crime mapping to connect crimes within specific boundaries. This function is important to law enforcement as it provides a connection to criminal activity that may not have been made without the crime mapping analysis.

The use of crime analysis and crime mapping allows law enforcement departments to better allocate resources. This allows for the efficient and effective use of available manpower in reducing crime. Crime analysis is also utilized to inform community members of current activity within their neighborhoods and encourage the community to become involved in crime prevention activities.

Unit 2 >> Application of Crime Analysis Principles

Introduction

As we are discovering, crime analysis can be effective in the overall prevention and/or reduction of crime. However, an agency needs to develop a plan for the implementation of crime analysis into the organization. This unit will discuss important elements regarding the crime analysis function and organization implementation.

As research and practice have shown, the most effective methods police employ to identify and prevent crime is the use of crime analysis. However, research has also shown that a clear link between crime analysis and the clearance of actual crime incidents is weak. There is some research that shows that a strategy based in deterrence can be effective in reducing crime as well. The common element in both strategies is the inclusion of crime analysis and the belief that it is a fundamental necessity in identifying and reducing crime.

Due to the recent inclusion of crime analysis in law enforcement, the profession still struggles with recognizing the benefits and effectiveness of including the crime analysis function as a staple element in reducing crime. To assist in overcoming the hesitation of incorporating crime analysis, a system of stratified policing may be implemented to assist in organizing crime analysis and implementing crime reduction programs. According to Santos (2017), "It is the only policing approach that seeks to institutionalize crime analysis into the day-to-day operations of the police department and specifically lays out a structure for crime analysis products and how they should be used."

Stratified policing is implemented in stages, or levels. The purpose is to identify crime, disorder, and quality-of-life issues at various stages. The stages are based on evidences and data collected, and they address the activity of crime. Each level is categorized based on the nature of the crime and the severity of occurrence. Accountability is a key element for success of stratified policing. This involves holding meetings on a basis as deemed necessary, grounded on the activity-based level.

Unit 3 >> The Analysis of Crime

Introduction

Crime analysis is a key function of law enforcement as it helps to identify trends in criminal activity. Crime analysis also contributes to the identification of patterns of crime by analyzing various pieces of information related to each crime act committed. Information that is used in crime analysis includes, but is not limited to, type of crime, location, method, weapon used, and if applicable, suspect description and witness statements.

In this unit, we will explore the crime analysis function and data collection process necessary to allow for effective and useful crime analysis. Information is pulled from various sources such as police reports, officer observations, officer's personal experiences, and witness observations and perceptions, which is then gathered, sorted, and organized. This organized information is termed data.

To have effective crime analysis, the collection of data must be accomplished with specific goals in mind. The data must be appropriate for the analysis to be conducted, accurately and consistently collected in a timely manner, and stored in a raw downloadable format for a specific length of time as to be useful. The data must also remain in a format that may be queried in various ways.

As we will examine, computers and computer technology are key elements of effective crime analysis. Therefore, it is crucial that crime analyst ensure the integrity of the data is not compromised. To protect the integrity of the data, several factors must be considered and compensated for.

Crime analysis is a discipline that relies heavily on computer technology—both hardware and software. The following factors affect data integrity: data entry timeliness, validity, reliability, data transfer process, data confidentiality and privacy, and data management.

Once data is collected and sorted, analysis of the data may begin. This analysis includes the use of two techniques—statistical and visualization. Those techniques include tactical, strategic, and administrative crime analysis. Once the data has been analyzed, geographic information is added. The combination of the analyzed data and geographic information is pooled to create crime maps. Crime mapping may be provided in two ways—descriptive mapping or analytical mapping.

Unit 4 >> Tactical Crime Analysis

Introduction

Tactical crime analysis requires the use of repeat data on incidents and crime analysis techniques specific to tactical crime analysis. It is important to understand the different characteristics of the data that is best suited to tactical crime analysis. Repeat data incident location analysis is a simple and direct process.

There are three goals to tactical crime analysis. The purpose of these goals is to collect tactical data that provides the analyst information needed to identify patterns and investigative leads. The data is also used to clear outstanding cases.

Pattern identification is used to link crimes that have similar patterns. These patterns include many things, some of which may be the type of crime, the MO of the perpetrator, method of entry, vehicle type or identifiers, and suspect characteristics. This piece of analysis comprises most of the tactical crime analysis processes. There are two approaches used to compile the information—the deduction and induction methods.

The tactical crime analysis process discusses the differences between person crimes and property crimes. This data is analyzed using pattern analysis and applied to problem-solving strategies. Additional information that is analyzed is "key characteristics used to identify patterns for these crimes, and potential responses used by police for these patterns" (Santos, 2017, p. 245).

Once analyzed the information must be disseminated to law enforcement personnel that has the authority to develop programs and strategies to address the patterns and follow up with investigative leads.

This unit focuses on the many aspects of tactical crime analysis, and how the data is collected, organized, analyzed, and disseminated.

Unit 5 >> The Role of Community Policing in Crime Analysis

Introduction

This unit describes the crime analysis function and the impact the process has on community policing. Community policing has been adopted by many law enforcement agencies in recent years. Community policing, or the concept of community policing, has changed and evolved over the years. Yet, with the many changes and adaptations, a definitive definition of community policing does not exist. However, law enforcement leaders have reached a consensus that community policing is partnerships and relationships with the community. The objective is to develop an understanding of the perceived issues experienced by the community. The ultimate goal is to encourage community cooperation, validate the legitimacy of police efforts, and develop processes to respond to problems.

To help meet these goals, crime analysis is used to inform community members of significant events as well as to foster police transparency. Crime analysis is also used by law enforcement in an effort to accept shared responsibility for community crime problems.

Law enforcement agencies also use crime analysis techniques to collect and analyze information and comments from citizens. This usually involves collecting information regarding community member satisfaction with police, experiences from victims, community perceptions of crime and crime prevention methods, and personal safety. The information is analyzed and used to strengthen community relationships, identify common problems and repeated crimes, and develop programs and prevention methods to address community concerns.

In this unit, we will discuss the evolution of community policing and the methods analysts use to measure information collected. We will also discuss the ways this information disseminated to the community and used by law enforcement agencies.

Unit 6 >> Strategic Crime Analysis

Introduction

Strategic crime analysis uses specific processes and statistics to analyze different problems. To determine what information is relevant, an examination of methods and techniques specific to strategic crime analysis must be completed.

Because strategic crime analysis is dependent on a variety of data, there is no one set way for looking at problems. This includes the nature of the problem, available data or information that can be analyzed, as well as the results of the analysis. Critical thinking is required for problem analysis. Strategic crime analysis has no correct or incorrect solutions. A systematic technique approach must be implemented to understand the problem and the causes of that problem.

Strategic crime analysis techniques are structured around specific questions that address crime trends, sociodemographics, and other problem areas within the agency jurisdiction. With the use of hypothesis, the techniques implemented dig into the problem to determine what primary data will be used for the analysis.

Last, dissemination of the information is completed, taking into consideration what information should be disseminated and what specific strategic crime analysis information is needed for developing strategies in crime reduction measures.

In this unit, we will discuss the different techniques used to look at strategic crime analysis.

Unit 7 >> Presentation of Crime Data

Introduction

To effectively address crime analysis, the typology that classifies crime analysis must include a discussion on the breakdown of the results by type. This breakdown includes the type of activity, the purpose of the analysis, and the audience the results are being presented to.

Typology is a classification system that provides a structure for crime analysis results based on the stratification of type of problem, purpose of crime analysis results, and type of audience. The nature of crime problems is sorted into three categories—immediate problems, short-term problems, and long-term problems.

Crime analysts present crime analysis to organizational leaders for the purpose of facilitating situational awareness of crime and creating strategies for crime reduction. Crime analysts gather and analyze information to report activities of crime. However, the information does not include an interpretation of how the information relates to other factors. To create strategies for crime reduction, results are created to give law enforcement guidance in what is needed to target specific crimes, including all data available and any relationship that may exist between the data.

The audience the crime analyst usually presents this information to are broken into three categories: operational, management, and command. According to Santos (2017), operational personnel generally refers to line-level officers. Management personnel generally refer to mid-level police managers, such as lieutenants, and command personnel generally refers to those who serve as the leadership of the police organization, such as the chief or sheriff.

Unit 9 >> Criminal Justice Theory

Introduction

Traditionally, crime analysis involves the process of collecting and organizing data and finding trends and patterns from the data. Rarely do crime analysts rely on or use theory to guide the crime analysis process. However, with the evolutionary nature of crime analysis, crime analysts are discovering the need to use criminological theories related to crime.

Crime analysis is used to identify crime patterns and trends and assist in predicting the next potential occurrence. The analyst is not looking for the root cause of the crime, therefore, sociological and psychological theories are inappropriate in crime analysis. Crime analysis centers on crime that have already been committed, not crime that has yet to happen. Therefore, law enforcement must concentrate on why crimes are being committed and who is

committing the crime. As a result, criminal justice theories focused on what motivates the criminal would be appropriate. This unit introduces the use of theory to the crime analysis function and attempts to explain the importance of using theory in combination with the data collected.
