Course Overview

In this course, you will examine what constitutes a project in a public agency and the various aspects that are incorporated with project management, such as planning, team building and dynamics, time management, and leadership. Project managers are often tasked with effectively navigating the often-competing interests of strategic thinking and tactical responsiveness; you will examine and evaluate the roles and challenges associated with those aspects. You will analyze the concept of strategic planning in project management and apply that concept to real-world situations and case studies to offer strategies and solutions for ensuring a project is executed effectively.

Public sector project managers often operate in an environment with unique constraints with respect to compliance and reporting requirements. However, the public sector can still benefit from applying aspects of general project management practices. In particular, an emphasis on the role of leadership, team dynamics, and emphasis on efficiency may help public sector managers clearly define and execute their project management responsibilities. Introduction

Assignment Overview

Since project management in the public sector involves many stakeholders, strategic planning for a project can be key to ensuring project success. However, what does it mean to think and plan strategically about project management in the public sector context? You will explore this in your first assignment.

Assignment Instructions

Select two real-world public sector project management examples. Choose an example of effective strategic planning and an example of ineffective strategic planning. In your 6–8-page analysis, address the following:

- Explain the concept of strategic planning in project management.
- Provide a brief overview of the two selected examples.
- Differentiate key factors that characterize the two examples of strategic planning, including discussing whether any strategic frameworks were used.
- Evaluate the roles associated with the planning and implementation of each project, with emphasis on how those roles affected strategic planning efforts.
- Critique how each example addressed challenges.

Submission Requirements

Your assessment should meet the following requirements:

- **Written communication:** Your writing should clearly identify where each grading criterion or part of the assignment is addressed. Your points must be logical, substantive, and relevant based on the evidence presented. The writing must be free of errors that detract from the overall message.
- **APA guidelines:** Resources and citations must be formatted according to current APA style and formatting. Be sure to distinguish an electronic journal article by including the DOI or website. When appropriate, use APA-formatted headings.
- **Resources:** Your ideas must be supported with relevant scholarly sources that are dated within the past five years and are properly cited and referenced in current APA style.
- **Length of paper:** 6–8 typed, double-spaced pages, not including the title page and references.
- **Font and font size:** Times New Roman, 12 point.
- **Writing assistance:** Additional resources and support are available through the Writing Center and Smarthinking's free, online tutoring service.

Introduction

Projects in the public sector may originate from a variety of sources, including legislative or codified mandates, needs assessments, and organizational initiatives, among others. Unit 4 >> If You Fail to Plan, You Plan to Fail, Part 2: Thorough Planning

Introduction

This unit builds upon the work you did in the last unit on conceptualization and asks you to consider best practices in project planning. In particular, we discuss the role of internal controls in project planning in preventing fraud and ensuring accountability. The nature of the project—for example, whether the project is technological in scope—can also influence how we can plan to ensure accountability. Finally, we discuss how to develop, articulate, and limit the scope of a project, and why it is important to have a clear plan on deliverables and timelines.

Introduction

The final part of the project planning process consists of establishing a schedule, estimating costs, and assessing risk. To complete this final phase of project planning, the project manager must apply the conceptualization and strategic planning concepts we have been discussing in the previous two units. In this unit, you are asked to select a controversial project and evaluate the impacts of the political environment on the project. In doing your work, consider how politics can impact each and every stage of the project planning process—from conceptualization to strategic planning to establishing schedules and estimating costs.

Assignment Overview

Whenever you are operating in leadership positions in the public sector environment, you are subject to oversight of your project by the elected officials who serve the public interest. For this assignment, find a private or public sector project over the past five years that has been deemed controversial in the media. Analyze this project using a planning framework and evaluate the success of the project.

Assignment Instructions

In your 5–7-page analysis, address the following:

- Describe the chosen public sector project.
- Evaluate how the political environment at the time shaped the project.
- Appraise the challenges the project faced throughout the process.
- Critique the project management process using an evaluative framework.
 - Was there a strategic plan?
 - Were the correct agents selected?
 - Was the execution monitored and controlled properly?
- Formulate changes to the project management process.

Different organizations have different power dynamics and reliance upon hierarchical structures. For example, the Marine Corps and the Peace Corps have different missions and different structures. Unit 8 >> Agreements and Contracts in the Public Sector Context
