Course Description

A semester-long, study of musical styles and concepts as practiced in various cultural, political, and social contexts throughout the world.

Course Goal

To develop a basic knowledge of selected styles/genres of music from around the world and to understand the cultural concomitants that give meaning to each.

Expected Outcomes (and Assessment)

By the end of the semester, you will:

- Actively engage in experiences in the arts as an observer through analysis of an online video of a live musical performance (Blackboard examination).
- Reflect upon your experiences in the arts through comparative analysis of music from other cultures (Blackboard examination).
- Understand the role of the arts within varied historical, cultural, artistic, social, religious, and/or political contexts through course readings and lectures (Blackboard examination).

Nature of the Course

Attendance for the course is based on the timely completion of Blackboard assignments. This is an *asynchronous* course, meaning there are no set meetings. You can complete assignments via Blackboard anytime day or night. The number of assignments will require you to log on to Blackboard at least several times a week, M-F, during regular semesters. During Winter or Summer term, you will likely have to work on the course almost every day.

The single most important factor for success in the course is the timely completion of assignments. BE SURE TO KEEP UP WITH THE COURSE CALENDAR.

Attendance

Catawba professors retain the right to fail any student who is absent from 25% of class sessions. Two absences (cumulative) may result in a one letter grade deduction from the final grade after the earned points are calculated for the course. More than two absences can result in a grade of "F" (see *The Catawba Catalog* for details). An instructor may allow late work but that

does not override or negate the absence. All absences will be used in calculating the cumulative 25% missed attendance limit.

Attendance for this online course is based on completing assignments due the various modules. A minimum of one graded reading guide must be submitted each week to be considered present for a particular chapter. Failure to submit any online assignments during a week is considered absent from class. Turning in a late assignment from a prior module does not count towards attendance.
