#### **Course Description:**

The Legal System introduces the student to the concept of crime; explaining and defining the legal system from the point when a crime is committed through to the disposition, or sentencing. It examines how the individual components of the system, law enforcement, the courts, and corrections, influence society's overall response to crime. An understanding of the legal process is one of the building blocks of developing an understanding of the social causes, consequences, and responses to dysfunctional behavior.

#### **Course Design**

This course will be conducted in an online, accelerated, 6-week format. This does not mean that the amount of material covered in the course has been reduced from a traditional 14-week course; rather it means that the student will be responsible for completing individual assignments that are designed to demonstrate an understanding of the material that is covered.

This course will use the College's Canvas website to enhance and support student learning. The support and instructional material includes what I would call mico-lectures to highlight some of the important material presented in the text. These are no full classroom lectures because the student is responsible for

processing some of the material on his or her own. In addition, each chapter has a quiz that is associated with it. The quiz is designed to demonstrate that you read the chapter. There are also chapter questions that are posted, which are designed to test your comprehension of the readings. Finally, there are also two tests that are also designed to test student comprehension.

The website is broken down into learning modules that will follow the weekly format of the course. All of the material that will be covered in that week will be described in the weekly heading and will appear below the designated week. The work is time consuming so please do not underestimate the amount of time that is required to participate in this course. Reading for comprehension is not easy but the online nature of the course requires that you master this task

### **Course Objectives**

Through this course, the intent is to assist the student to develop and use critical thinking skills to:

- 1. Gain a more in depth understanding of each of the individual components of the criminal justice system; law enforcement; the courts; and corrections.
- 2. Identify the key elements of each of the individual components of the legal system
- 3. Develop an understanding of the development of policing in America and its impact of the legal system.
- 4. Develop an understanding of the historical structure of the American court system and will be able to distinguish between the state and federal court systems.
- 5. Develop an understanding of the rationale for punishment and describe the impact each rationale has had on society.
- 6. Distinguish between probation and parole; between a jail and a prison; and identify the modern alternatives to incarceration.
