Course Title: NUR 326: Concepts in Professional Nursing

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Course Hours and Credit Delineation Formula:

1 credit hour = 1 hour of class time per week

Theory: 3 credits = 3 hours per week x 14 weeks = 42 hours of class time

Course Pre-requisites: Cumulative GPA of 2.5; Satisfactory completion of prescribed nursing curriculum.

Course Description:

This course highlights current issues and trends in nursing and health care. The course provides an overview of topics relevant to professional nursing including the development of professional writing, history of nursing, nursing education & licensure, professional organizations, health care delivery systems, informatics as well as legal and ethical issues that impact nursing practice.

American Psychological Association (APA) editorial style is introduced and scholarly writing is emphasized.

Online Course Requirements:

Student requirements related to the online format are as follows:

1. A minimum of **Microsoft 2007** version will be the required format for all assignments. More recent versions are acceptable. The student will need to know how to attach a Word document and drop box submission links. ALL assignments are to be in WORD DOC files. If using Mac computers, save as Word documents (do not send as a PDF). PDF's are acceptable when submitting reference articles.
2. Students are required to have a webcam (integrated or add-on) for ProctorTrack.
3. Students must have a current video player such as VLC media player or Windows media player.
4. Students must be able to post and view videos via **YouTube**.
5. Students must have the most recent version of **Adobe Flash Player**. Free here <http://get.adobe.com/flashplayer/>
6. To successfully complete the online course, students should expect to be online in the course 5-6 **days per week** (time varies depending on proficiency)
7. Students should check email **daily** as is the policy with all nursing courses.
8. Students can expect a reply from the instructor via email within 48 hours.

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9. Students who would like to meet face to face, or via phone should email the instructor with this request.

Teaching Methods:

The course may include use of a variety of teaching methods such as:

- Discussions
- Reflective writing
- AV Lectures
- Power Point Presentations
- Internet Resources
- Exams
- Scholarly Paper
- Videos

The complete course outline with required readings will be located in the online course.

Course Specific Policies:

Class Attendance:

Participation during class is expected. Participation includes asynchronous attendance (signing into the course on a regular basis), completing assignments and engaging in classroom discussion (discussion boards).

Communication:

Students are obligated to check their email on a daily basis. Cedar Crest email will be the primary means of communication for NUR 326. Faculty will make every attempt to answer emails within 48 hours not including weekends and holidays. All communication should have a professional and courteous tone including email and online discussion. Netiquette rules apply.

Questions about the assignment should be directed to the course instructor well in advance of the due dates. Questions regarding directions for assignments will be taken up to 48 hours prior to the due date to prevent last minute confusion and encourage organization and planning.

Academic Misconduct:

Students who breach the Academic Standard of Integrity are subject to sanctions imposed by an instructor, the Dean of School of Nursing, the provost, or the Board of Trustees. Such sanctions can range from, but are not limited to, the reduction in grade for an assignment or course, or the failure of an assignment or course. Extreme cases of academic misconduct, as determined by the provost or the Board of Trustees, may result in suspension or expulsion from the college, or the withholding, denial, or rescinding of academic degrees.

For NUR 326 - Students are allowed to utilize personal class notes, Powerpoints, printed articles, the APA Manual, and scavenger hunts during exams.

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Students are prohibited from using the computer and internet (web browsing or electronic course site materials), peers, colleagues, friends/family, or other personal assistance of any kind (collusion). Students may not attempt to reproduce exam content by taking notes, photographs or screenshots/screen capture of any kind during the exam.

Evidence of cheating or collusion on a course assessment (quiz, exam or assignment) will result in failure of the course. Evidence of plagiarism or collusion on a course assignment or the scholarly paper will result in a 0 for the assignment.

Late Policy:

Complete assignment submissions are due online on the date/time assigned. Late is determined by the online course calendar & clock, therefore assignments are late beginning one minute after the due date/time. **Ten percent (10%) of the total points for the assignment will be deducted from the grade for each day late for both the assignment and references.** After five full days the assignment grade will be zero (0). Reduction days include weekend days and holidays.

Students will submit all materials online and may be asked for hard copies by their course instructor. It is the student's responsibility to know the due dates/times of assignments and see that they are submitted and received properly. Plan ahead for unexpected delays in submitting assignments and/or technical difficulties. The instructor is not required to send out reminders for missing or overdue assignments. Assignments and associated due dates are located in the pacing schedule and throughout the course.

No discussion board postings or replies will be accepted for grading after the close/due date of the discussion.

Exams

There is a **NO MAKE UP** policy on quizzes. If quizzes are missed, the grade will be a zero. Exams are scheduled by course faculty and must be taken when scheduled. No exam will be administered on an alternate date. A student that arrives late or after the scheduled time of an exam will not be given additional time to complete the exam. If there are extenuating circumstances that preclude the student from taking the exam on the scheduled date/time, it is the student's responsibility to communicate this with the course faculty prior to the start of the exam. Failure to do so may result in a zero for the exam. In the event of an extenuating circumstance that precludes the student from taking an exam on the scheduled date/time, points earned on the subsequent exam will be allotted for that exam in addition to the missed exam in the course gradebook. In the case that points earned on the final exam are allotted for the previous missed exam, points per item will be adjusted to align with the total points designated for the missed exam.

Final Exam

Students are obligated to complete the final exam, on the day and time scheduled by the Registrar's Office. Students are required to be available until the end of the final exam schedule as published by the Registrar's Office. The course instructor will administer final exams as scheduled by the Registrar's Office. No final exam will be administered on an alternate date. In the event of an

extenuating circumstance that precludes a student from taking the final exam on the scheduled date/time, the student is required to contact the course instructor prior to the start of the final exam. In this situation, an incomplete will be entered into the gradebook in accordance with College policy. An incomplete may impact progression in the Nursing program and require a student to re-track into an alternate program track.

ProctorTrack:

Online courses within the Nursing Department curriculum utilize Proctortrack to help ensure academic integrity. Proctortrack is integrated and required for this course. All students are required to “onboard” (setup and practice Proctortrack) in the syllabus quiz and utilize Proctortrack for the course midterm and final. Vericite:

Vericite is utilized in this course as a tool for students to learn appropriate citation of scholarly writing. The scholarly paper must be submitted to the course integrated Vericite page prior to the due date/time. Faculty reserve the right to evaluate the Vericite submission if the final scholarly paper submission shows evidence of plagiarism.
