#### Course Description / Objectives:

A study of the musical elements and development of listening skills as tools to explore the main avenues of twentieth century composition. Contemporary social and political activity as well as chronological stylistic development will be examined as stimulation for the varied types of twentieth century composition: Romantic, neoclassic, 12 tone, jazz, rock, movie music, and "Broadway" styles.

#### **Method of Instruction:**

Discussion, readings, use of audio/visual, writing assignments, class projects

#### **Communication Methods:**

E-mail is best way to communicate directly with the instructor. While e-mail provides a quick method of communication, responses may not always be sent or received immediately. All communication will be completed in a timely, but not always immediate, fashion.

Blackboard also now has a discussion forum for students to interact with their classmates. Sometimes questions that would normally be posed to the instructor can be answered more quickly by interacting with classmates. Students should utilize the general discussion board for questions pertaining due dates, procedures, and general knowledge inquiries.

#### **ACCESS Attendance Policy**

# Online Participation Policy:

Students will be required to participate in online discussions. Each discussion will be based around a subject having to do with issues in music. Each student must post a minimum of three times for each discussion-one response to the initial subject, and two responses to posts from other students. Posts are expected to be of substance-"Yes", "I agree with ....", and such kinds of posts will not be accepted. While personal views are encouraged, it is expected that each student will respect the opinions of other students in the class, that discussions will be civil and stay on the topic at hand. Posts for the week will be posted on Sunday. Initial posts should be made by Wednesday at noon, and subsequent posts must be made by Saturday at 5PM.

### Participation.

As we are not in a traditional setting, class attendance and participation cannot be evaluated in the traditional manner. While online courses provide convenience, it is expected that all students will complete and submit all assignments on time. Any assignment not submitted by the due date will not be accepted!

### Lead Reader Assignments:

Each week, I will post a list of questions to the students about the reading assignments for that week. Each student will be responsible to e-mail a minimum 2-3 paragraph response to one of the questions of their choosing. That response will be submitted to me by 11PM Tuesday evening. The response should contain both personal reflection and opinion as well as factual information from the book. *Please note that this does not mean that students only should read the part of the text that pertains to their question. Each student is responsible for the entire reading assignment.* 

#### Final Project/Pape

Each student will chose, with instructor's approval, an artist, composer, or performer of the Modern Era and create an analysis of that person or group. This project should include, but is not limited to, information about the performer's life and history, musical style(a), major works, significant events in the performer's career, and other important information relevant to the specific performer. Each student will submit a PowerPoint presentation that will be posted on the Blackboard site for the other students to view and analyze.
