Course Syllabus

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Course Description:

As a course in GEC IIIb, The Sociology of Family focuses explicitly on present day values issues. The goal is to engage the student in a process that requires some distancing from preconceptions, prejudices, and pre-

formed opinions. It requires the development of a reflective stance on one's received culture and its beliefs. It expects the student ultimately to take a position on the issue which is informed and well thought-

out as well as cognizant and respectful of others opinions on the issue.

An in-depth analysis of the values associated with the American family from a sociological

perspective. There will be particular emphasis on the themes of intimacy, diversity and str ength, as

they pertain to the family system. Family values, norms and customs will be studied, as well as the impact of cultural variations and major social issues that confront the family.

Course Objectives:

- a. To be able to conduct an analysis of the family from a sociological perspective and to use this perspective in examining gender socialization, ethnic identity, cultural values, sexual behavior, conflict resolution, divorce, etc.
- b. To understand the structure, functions and history of the family.
- c. To give attention to facts, trends and concepts for analysis when studying the family
- d. To be aware of the common myths and misconceptions about the nature of marriage and family.
- e. To reflect on, interpret and understand one's own family experience.
- f. To understand the impact of social change on the family over time.
- g. To utilize a sociological perspective as part of one's continuing intellectual
- h. To study American family patterns descriptively, historically, and anthropologically against the cultural backdrop of other societies.
- i. To examine alternatives to the traditional, nuclear family.
- j. To appreciate the important elements of love and compatibility in human relationships.
- k. To reflect on one's own family history.

<u>Term Paper #2 - Family Paper: (10 Points) - Due Date:</u> Sunday, April 25th, 2021 (Midnight)

The written assignment is a course requirement and an integral part of your coursework; it is worth 10% of your grade.

Select a topic for **your paper** on any aspect of Family, such as:

Gay/Lesbian Family Life, Interracial Family Life, Mixed Religion Family Life, Single/Divorced Family Life, Cultural Specific Family Group.

^{*}What did you learn about your family that you didn't know before?

^{*}Based on the genogram, what types of family patterns have become apparent?

^{*}How do these affect you or your relationship(s)?

These topics are suggestions you may have a different topic in mind. You are welcome to discuss your topic with me prior to doing your research. Using our library recourses locate articles on your topic and submit a type typed summary that includes how your how your topic relates to culture and diversity in our society.

Your term paper should specifically include an application of two values framework to the topic (i.e., how do people from each framework view the issue) and an assessment of the issue from your perspective. After researching the topic and looking at it from the perspective of the two value frameworks, what is your conclusion?

Your paper should also show your knowledge of the class room material. General rule of thumb, you will need several articles to have a successful paper.
