Course Description/Objectives

This course is the second of a two-semester course designed to introduce the student to accounting principles.

 - ☐ Classify costs as variable, fixed, or mixed and compute the break-even point
 - ☐ Understand the difference between absorption and variable costing
 - ☐ Describe budgeting, its objectives, and its impact on human behavior
 - ☐ Illustrate how standards are used in business
 - ☐ Differential analysis and product pricing
 - ☐ Capital investment analysis
 - ☐ Cost allocation and activity-based costing
 - ☐ Understand who we are accountable to? =Religious Orientation
 - ☐ How should we view the created world? = Creational Structure
 - ☐ What is the role of accounting in a market economy? = Creational Development
 - ☐ What should we as Christians do to improve the workplace? = Contemporary Response
