Course Description

This course emphasizes the use and interpretation of financial data to support effective decision making. Topical areas include cost behavior, variance analysis, product pricing, financial budgets and capital budgeting analysis.

Credit Hours: 3 credits

Overview and Course Goals

GOALS: The student that successfully completes BSAD 526 – Managerial Accounting will demonstrate the following:

- 1. Develop an understanding and interpret the rapid flow of management financial systems and the information they provide.
- 2. Utilize the different costing methods and how managerial accounting adds value to the organization.
- 3. Understand how different production or service activity and cost behavior impacts final product or service costs.
- 4. Develop analytical skills by understanding how a master budget is developed (fixed vs flexible) for the organization.
- 5. Understanding the Balanced Scorecard and other ways to measure performance.
- 6. Determine the importance of capital budgeting and how that impacts future financial and product decisions for the organization.

POLICIES AND PROCEDURES:

- Attendance Students are expected to be actively present in class, either online or in person. Any make-up work will be at the discretion of the instructor. *Note that there are no specific points allocated to attendance alone...attending class does not guarantee a grade but does make achieving a higher grade much more likely.*
- In the event inclement weather or COVID-19 interferes with class, you will receive an email letting you know what we will be doing and I will make videos of all material to assist you in completing the assigned work.
- Issues involving academic performance in the course should be addressed with the instructor. Students are encouraged to not wait long in raising and addressing issues.
- Late work will not be accepted without an extenuating circumstance as defined by the instructor. You will need to be sure to keep up as all material builds on previous week's materials. There are many opportunities for points in the class that are not related to exams so that students who have test anxiety have many opportunities to achieve their desired grade in the course.

COVID-19 POLICY

Students who have been diagnosed with COVID-19 or who have been advised to quarantine or isolate by a medical professional or a Friends University employee should contact their instructors to make arrangements in order to avoid falling behind in class. Detail on Graded Assignments

Discussion Question responses must meet the following criteria:

- 300-400 word count, excluding citations and references
- Responses must include at least one reference to an outside source
- Avoid offering perspectives that you cannot substantiate through the reading, outside research, or personal professional experience

SUBSTANTIVE POSTS

Substantive Posts (SP) are responses to other student's initial Discussion Questions (DQ) responses. The concept of the SP is to create proactive and encouraging involvement in discussion with classmates. The expectation is that students will draw upon professional experience, interpretation of the assigned readings, and other reference material to enrich the broader body of knowledge for the class.

Substantive Posts must meet the following criteria:

- 200-300 word count, excluding citations and references
- Responses should draw from the assigned readings, outside research, and/or professional experience
- Utilize in-text citations and references, as appropriate (optional)
- It is appropriate to offer contrasting opinions on a topic, in fact encouraged, but be sensitive to the "tone" used, when disagreeing with another student's perspective. Avoid using phrases such as; "I believe you are wrong", or "I don't believe your answer is correct", etc. Instead, open with phrases such as; "I would like to offer another perspective on this topic", or "According to (outside research citation) there is another perspective on this issue". Remember the goal here is to enrich our dialogue while maintaining a collegial environment. You will find that there will be many different perspectives and scholarly opinions on some of your DQ's.

Each week students will post 1 original post is worth 14 points and at least 2 response posts @ 3 points each.
