Syllabus

Course Overview, Description and Position in the Curriculum

Introductory Psychology - 3 credit hours

The course provides the student a comprehensive overview of the subject, which includes: philosophies, theories, developmental aspects and understandings of the psychological make-up of the human organism.

This course is designed to help students acquire knowledge in and understanding of the broad scope of the field of psychology as it applies to behavior, biology, human development, personality, and research. This course meets General Education Goal 4: Breadth of Knowledge – Social Sciences and History.

PSYC 100/110 is required for all students majoring or minoring in Marketing and suggested for all majors in the Division of Business and Information Technology. Introduction to Psychology meets the Social & Behavioral Sciences General Education requirement for CGPS (College of Graduate and Professional Studies and CBASE (College of Business, Arts, Sciences and Business). This course is also a core requirement in the Bachelor of Science degree in Human services/Psychology and meets Perspectives General Education Requirement.

Course Objectives

By the end of the course, the student will be able to:

- describe the basic theories of psychology
- develop a basic understanding of the history of psychology
- **understand** the basic principles of psychology; biological aspects, human development, learning, personality, stress and coping, normal and abnormality
- understand the contextual factors affecting basic psychology (ethics, culture, gender, social economic)
- understand the concept of "self" and "others"

Course Outcomes

At the conclusion of this course, students should demonstrate* the following:

- understanding of the science of psychology, its evolution and continual development
- awareness of the major psychological approaches to the study of human behavior
- familiarity of psychological terminology, concepts and findings
- understanding of psychology's methodology and limitations
- higher critical thinking skills
- ability to write appropriately in the behavioral science field

Course Expectations, Responsibilities and Recommendations

- ✓ Should you find that you are unable to complete this course you are responsible for dropping the class (through the Registrar's Office). If you do not "officially" drop the course, I will have no choice but to enter a final grade into your transcript equal to your efforts.

Quizzes

Quizzes are closed-book and timed (20 minutes). However, you have two attempts. The highest score will automatically be recorded in the grade book. Questions are primarily drawn from the weekly chapter readings in your textbook and supporting resources available to you in the course on Moodle. Questions are multiple choice. Quizzes are worth 10 points. Please be prepared to take the quiz in its entirety when you open it. Quizzes will open each week on Tuesday at 8am and close Sunday at 11:59pm except for Week 8 which will close on Saturday at 11:59pm.

Online Learning – Discussion Boards

Discussion Boards or Forums in an online environment are one of the most critical elements to the class. Your postings and comments should be thoughtful and demonstrate thorough understanding of the topic, questions, and/or readings. Discussion Boards are not just an assignment to obtain points; they are utilized to influence your critical thinking as well as that of your peers. It is understood that you are busy, working adults and young adults. With that being said, I often see students hurriedly posting at the last minute just to complete the task and receive the points. When such a practice is utilized, it does not give an opportunity for productive, flourishing, conversation that enhances learning.

Discussion Question Responses MUST meet the following criteria:

- 1. Discussion Posts initial reply to the discussion questions AND 2 subsequent replies to classmate's replies must be SUBSTANTIVE POSTS.
 - a. The **concept** of substantive posts is to create proactive and encouraging involvement in discussion with classmates.
 - b. The <u>expectation</u> is that students will draw upon professional or personal experience, interpretation of the assigned readings, and other reference material to enrich the broader body of knowledge for the class.
- 2. **100-word** count minimum, excluding citation and references.
- 3. **References** must be provided to support ideas, opinions, and facts.
- 4. At least one (1) in-text citation must be utilized (more if needed), and references, as appropriate. *In other words, RELATE your posts to the chapter's content.*
- 5. Avoid offering perspectives that you cannot substantiate through the reading, outside (verifiable) research, or personal professional experience.
- 6. THREE POSTINGS, minimum. Your original posting worth 10 points AND two (2) replies to DIFFERENT classmates, worth 5 points each.

Additional information concerning discussion boards...

- To receive full credit:
 - Substantive posts submitted to the discussion prompts by THURSDAY midnight each week, later initial posts will receive fewer points and are due by Sunday at 10:55pm, initial posts submitted after Sunday at 10:55pm will receive a zero.
 - Substantive responses to 2 classmates in a timely fashion soon thereafter.

- o Replies posted on SUNDAY after 11:59 pm will not receive credit.
- o Requirements listed above and reiterated in the rubric below are met.
- Discussion Boards cannot be made up later.
- Your posts must occur during the week required or you will not receive credit.

Examples of Academic Dishonesty/Definitions:

- 1. <u>Cheating</u>: This includes, but is not limited to, unauthorized use of books, library materials, notes, study aids or information on an examination or quiz; b) altering a graded work after it has been returned, then submitting the work for re-grading; c) using another person's work and submitting that work as your own; d) submitting identical or similar papers for credit in more than one course without prior permission from the course instructor.
- 2. <u>Plagiarism</u>: Defined as the use of another's written work without proper citation, including borrowing of an idea or phrase or para-phrasing of material without proper citation; b) use of another student's work in any form; c) the purchase and/or use of a paper or assignment written by someone other than the student.
- 3. <u>Fabrication</u>: Falsifying, inventing, forging or altering any information, data, citation or academic record; b) presenting data that were not gathered in accordance with standard guidelines defining the appropriate methods for collecting or generating data and failing to include an accurate account of the method by which the data were gathered or collected.
- 4. Obtaining an Unfair Advantage: Obtaining or giving assistance to another person during an examination/quiz unless collaboration is permitted; b) obtaining, attempting to obtain or use of obtained copies of non-circulated examinations or questions; stealing, destroying, defacing or concealing library materials with the purpose of depriving others of their use; c) intentionally interfering with another student's academic work; d) unauthorized use of any electronic devices or otherwise undertaking activity with the purpose of creating or obtaining an unfair academic advantage over other students' academic work.
- 5. <u>Aiding and Abetting Academic Dishonesty</u>: Providing material, information, or other assistance to another person with knowledge that such aid could be used in any of the violations stated above, or b) providing false information to a University official conducting an inquiry regarding academic integrity.
- 6. <u>Falsification of Records and Official Documents</u>: Altering documents affecting academic records; b) forging signatures of authorization or falsifying information on an official academic document including but not limited to a grade report, letter of permission, petition, drop/add form, ID card, or any other official University document.
- 7. <u>Unauthorized Access:</u> Gaining unauthorized access to University computerized academic or administrative records or systems; b) viewing or altering computer records; c) modifying computer programs or systems; d) releasing or dispensing information

gained via unauthorized access; e) or interfering with the use or availability of computer systems or information.

Academic Integrity Process:

When a professor/instructor determines a violation of the honor code has occurred, s/he takes the following actions:

- 1. Complete Section One of the Academic Integrity Incident Report Form.
- Notify the Division Chair (CBASE)/Program Director (CAPS/Graduate School) of incident by sending a copy of the completed Academic Integrity Incident Report Form, Section One.
- 3. Division Chair/Program Director will contact the Office of the University Registrar to check for prior academic honor code violations.

If the student has no prior documented violations:

- 1. Professor/instructor meets with the student to discuss the problem.
- 2. Student can admit the violation and accept sanction determined by professor/instructor.
- 3. If student accepts sanction, professor/instructor and student sign Section Two of the Academic Integrity Incident Form and forward form to the Office of the University Registrar with supporting documentation.
- 4. If student does not accept sanction, Section Two of the Academic Integrity Incident Form is completed, signed and the matter is referred to the Division Chair/Program Director for resolution.
- 5. If the matter is not resolved with the Division Chair/Program Director; Section Three of the Academic Integrity Incident Form is completed, signed and the matter is referred to the Dean of the College who reviews the case and refers the matter with comment to the Academic Integrity Board for resolution.

If the student has prior documented violations:

- 1. All second time (or greater) offenses are referred directly to the Academic Integrity Board.
- 2. The Board conducts a hearing and adjudicates the matter.

All completed Academic Integrity Incident Forms, supporting documentation, hearing documentation and materials are retained by the Office of the University Registrar. Record documentation is appended to educational records (as defined by FERPA) as deemed necessary and appropriate.

Hearing Procedures:

The Chair of the Academic Integrity Board or designee will serve as the Hearing Officer. Hearings will be open to only those persons who are part of the proceedings and/or invited by the Board as warranted. Students involved in a hearing must keep all information from the hearing confidential. The Board shall be responsible for rendering a decision of responsible or not responsible for the alleged academic integrity violation.

The Hearing Officer shall be responsible for communicating the Board's determination to all involved parties. The accused student shall receive written notification within 10 business days of the Board's determination and any sanctions imposed. The decision will also be communicated to the course instructor and student's advisor/success coach.

Sanctions:

The following sanctions, or combination thereof, may be imposed by the Academic Integrity Board.

- Academic Integrity Warning: This sanction constitutes a written notice to the student
 that their conduct is in violation of the Academic Honor Code and such violations are
 not condoned by the University. This notice will become a part of the student's
 educational record as defined by FERPA.
- Academic Integrity Restriction: This sanction is given for those violations in which the
 infraction has caused serious concerns regarding the student's ability to be academically
 successful. In this case, the Board may uphold the professor/instructor's original
 resolution regarding the matter.
- Academic Integrity Probation: This sanction is one that places the student in serious academic jeopardy with the University. Further academic integrity violations may result in academic dismissal.
- Academic Integrity Notation: This sanction is one that places an official notation in a student's educational record (as defined by FERPA) and includes an academic integrity violation notation on the student's official institutional transcript.
- Academic Integrity Suspension: This sanction is one of involuntary separation of the student from the University for a set period of time. Students shall be withdrawn from classes, will not receive letter grades and/or refunds of money, which would be appropriate if they were voluntarily withdrawing from the institution. Permission to apply for re-admission may be granted with or without stipulations.
- Academic Integrity Dismissal: This sanction is one of permanent separation of the student from the University. Students dismissed for academic integrity reasons will not be granted the privilege of re-admittance to Friends University.

<u>Additional Stipulations</u>: It is the prerogative of the Academic Integrity Board to add stipulations to any sanction. Examples include but are not limited to; academic support services, limitation of registration, counseling, limitation of academic or co-curricular privileges, community service, educational projects or programs, course retakes, or letters or apology.

Appeal Procedures:

The accused student may appeal the Academic Integrity Board's determination. The appeal must be made in writing within 30 calendar days to the Vice President of Academic Affairs. The Vice President, in consultation with the President, will respond for the University. The appeal decision is final.

Tobacco-Free Campus:

Effective July 1, 2017 Friends University became a tobacco-free campus. The policy bans the use of all tobacco products, including cigarettes, cigars, smokeless tobacco, electronic cigarettes and other vaping/hookah products.
