Course Description

This course examines the political, economic, cultural, and intellectual development of nations across the world in the years since 1900, as well as the emergence of non-governmental centers of power such as terrorist groups and international corporations. Topics include The Scramble for Africa, World War I, the increasing importance of China and India in the Far East, the evolution of Israeli/Arab hostility, the independence movements in Africa, and global interrelations of the 21st century.



Introduction to Modern World History is an exploration of world history since the time of the Scramble for Africa, focusing particularly on the age of imperialism and the process of decolonization.



Discussion Boards (30%)

Students are expected to respond to a Discussion Topic each week, and then respond to three other posts in that Discussion forum during the week.

Discussion: Your grade on the Discussion topics each week is contingent upon several factors:

- Strength of content and staying on topic; provide supporting evidence and concepts from the readings whenever possible, and include a reference, link, or citation when appropriate.
- Word totals for your initial post should be a minimum of 150 words.
- A minimum of four posts, including your original response to the Discussion question, and at least three responses to your classmates or the instructor.
- You are expected to participate on at least 2 different days, and your first post should be no later than Thursday.
- Please refer to the Discussion Board Grading Rubric posted under the link to Syllabus and Policies and Canvas.



Weekly Assignments: 40%

Students need to complete each Weekly Assignment, consisting of games, questions, presentations, and a video recording. These assignments will be related to the course readings and videos. Please submit assignments as a Microsoft Word document on Canvas no later than 11:59 p.m. EST on Sunday of each week.



Decolonization Essay: 10%

Write a three to five-page paper in APA format that provides an overview of the process of decolonization following World War II, as well as a more detailed examination of the process in one of the following areas: Indochina, Latin America, African, or the Islamic heartlands.



Final Exam: 20%

The Final Exam will consist of several Essay questions and will be available during Week Fifteen.
