Course Description

This course will provide students with a general understanding of basic methodologies, concepts, theories, and practices in contemporary psychology. Areas of investigation may include the goals and research methodologies of psychology, the science of the brain, theories of human development and intelligence, concepts of motivation and emotions, the science of sensation and perceptions, and the current practices pertaining to psychological disorders, therapies, and treatments.



Course Goal

The goal of this course is to introduce students to various psychological theories and principles that shape human behavior. Students will learn how to apply these principles to real life experiences and career interests.

Assessments:

The basic goal of the course is to develop working knowledge of psychological constructs. This is the responsibility of both the student and instructor. A good attitude, although difficult to define, is a guidepost that is helpful. All assessments must be taken at the assigned time and date.

Failure to take a quiz or submit a Current Events paper at the scheduled time without prior agreement of the instructor will result in a zero for that assignment.

Quizzes (30% of final grade), discussion posts, and assignments will close each week on Sunday at 11:59 pm EST and cannot be made up.

Discussion Board (20%):

The Discussion Board (20%) is where you will have ongoing conversation with your classmates and instructor. Students are expected to log in and participate in weekly discussion activity at least every other day. In the majority of courses, participation at least every other day is necessary if students are to meaningfully interact on discussion issues presented in class. In other courses, it is necessary for students to complete readings and problem assignments prior to meaningful participation and thus the "every other day" requirement may be appropriately interpreted as 3 days per week.

In addition to posting a response to the weekly topic presented, students should respond to comments and questions from the instructor and/or two other students. This will give you a minimum of three posts each week.

Your posts should: include research citations to support your writing, further the thread topics, show that you have learned something from our readings or outside research, bring anecdotal, life experiences to the threaded issues, ask relevant and forward moving questions, and/or otherwise promote the Course Objectives for the week.

- 3 posts, 3 different days, 150-250 word minimum and grammatically correct WITH RESEARCH CITATIONS will receive full credit each week.
- Posts will be graded 0 % (no participation), 33 % (one substantial post), 66% (two substantial posts), or 100% (three substantial posts) each week.
- Posts that are not grammatically correct will not receive full credit.

- Posts that are one or two sentences will not receive credit.
- Discussions open each Monday and close each week on Sunday at 11:59 P.M. EST.
- Discussions may not be made up.

Quizzes (30%): There will be a total of 18 Quizzes. Quizzes will count as 30% of your final grade. Each are open-book and untimed. Each quiz will consist of 20 multiple-choice questions. Missing a quiz will result in a score of zero. Each quiz is found in the "Weekly Unit" section / MindTap link. All quizzes are to be submitted via Canvas and will close each Sunday at 11:59 pm EST.



Current Event Analysis (50%):

Fifty (50%) percent of your final grade will be based on successful completion of current event analysis writing. The purpose of this assignment is to analyze a current event through the lens of the psychological concepts discussed in class (e.g., conditioning and learning, gender roles, perception, psychosocial influence, motivation, etc.). To complete this assignment, you will identify a current event related to the topic of the week or important issue in our world today, research the topic, and write a 500+ word analysis (minimum). Include a link to the article/research or attach a copy. Specific details for these assignments are provided in Canvas.

Since this is a current events assignment, you are to choose a topic that is no more than 6 months old from the date the assignment is due.

The CEA assignments must be in APA format: title page, 500+ word analysis, reference page. Examples of what your paper should look like can be found in our classroom "Announcements" section.

**APA Style: This course follows APA style format for all written assignments. All written assignments must be produced using software that is compatible with Canvas. Assessment of written assignments will include use of APA format, writing, grammar, quotations, and references. APA Style Central is also available at http://apastylecentral.apa.org/, the course Canvas shell, and through the Hoffman Family Library.
