Course Title: American Government

#### **Course Description:**

This course introduces the student to the meaning of politics, its relationship to the concept of political power, and its impact upon governmental policy making. The course explores the nature and history of our political system and the various philosophical principles upon which it is based, and discusses national government institutions and the operation of national, state and local governments.

Prerequisites: None.

## **Learning Outcomes:**

Upon the successful completion of this course, students will be able to:

- 1. Describe purposes, powers, and limitations of the three (3. branches of government.
- 2. Recognize and evaluate the basic debates and issues in American Government and American political history.
- 3. Explain and critically assess the formal and informal political institutions and their respective roles in American politics.
- 4. Identify and describe the various levels of governments in our federalist system
- 5. Assess the causes and consequences of the different forms of political participation and outline the ways in which individuals and groups can affect political outcomes in the United States.
- 6. Assess the role of state and local governments in the American democracy.
- 7. Explain how government and politics impacts our daily life.

## **Grading Criteria**

## Online Discussions (worth 20 points each, for a total of 100 points)

You are expected to actively participate in a discussion of the material covered in our readings and lectures. This is worth a total of 100 points for the term. You can find a discussion forum for self-introductions and for each of the five weeks' content areas by going to the "Discussion Board" under the Tools button (at left).

During the first week, you should introduce yourself on the Self-Introduction forum. Then, during each module, you should make a total of three posts consisting of:

- 1) Create a thread of your own to make comments or ask questions about the material. You may think of the key themes and the impact on our government/society today; or, reference a particular current event issue. Make sure to reference the current event news sources. For example, if you tie in coverage of local elections, note where you pulled your information. Did you watch Fox News, CBS, or did you read *The New York Times* or a particular local/state newspaper?
- 2) Respond to at least two of your classmates.

## **Grading Requirements:**

- 1) If you meet these requirements by each deadline indicated, you will receive at least 15 of 20 points possible for each discussion. To get more than 15 points, the quality of your various posts will be taken into account. Are your comments insightful? Are your questions thought-provoking? Do your criticisms move discussion forward? And so forth. Further advice is provided by the instructor on the Self-Introduction forum. If you do not meet these requirements by the deadlines, your scores will be below 15 points.
- 2) If you only submit 2 posts, students will start at a score of 10 points for the discussion board. If you only submit 1 post, students will start at a score of 5 points for the discussion board.
- 3) There is no length requirement on the discussion board. However, comments must be substantively concerned with the material. Simply saying that something was interesting is not enough; simply saying that you agree with a classmate is not enough. In cases where no substantive concern for the course content is indicated, the post in question will not count as one of the three required.

## Question Sets (consist of short answer and essay - 100 points each, for a total of 500 points)

You will prepare a question set for each module, consisting of both objective and essay questions. The short answer questions aim to ensure that you can recognize the key issues and

identify the core components of our political system. One mandatory essay question each week invites students to explore the key themes and events presented in the module through description, explanation, and assessment. Students will be given a choice of two options for their second essay question each week. The second essay invites you, the student, to address the impact of government and politics on your daily life. Each question set is made up of:

- 10 Short Answer worth 5 points each [50 points]
- 2 Essay Questions worth 25 points each [50 points] Note that one essay will give you a choice on topics to apply the material to your own life.

## Grading Requirements:

1) Short Answer: The responses to these questions may consist of one or two sentences or words.

## 2) Essays:

- Each essay is worth 25 points and should be 200-250 words to fully address the question. Points will be deducted for responses that are short of the target accordingly:
  - o 180-199 words: 3 points deducted
  - o 179-150 words: 7 points deducted
  - o 149-100 words: 10 points deducted
  - o 100 words or less: Any answer that is less than 100 words will receive a score of 0.
- Students should craft well-written responses, meaning that grammar and organization
  count. For each answer with substantial grammatical errors (meaning that students did not
  spell check their work), 3 points will be deducted from the total score for the assignment.
  For each answer with extremely disruptive grammatical errors (meaning that students did
  not spell check their work or edit for sentence structure and punctuation), 5 points will be
  deducted from the total score for the assignment.
- The content of your responses should be thorough and scholarly. Jargon, lingo, and street language are to be avoided, and their use will decrease your grade. By way of example, and not limitation, "cop" is generally unacceptable, "police officer" is preferred. APA format should be used for any in-text citations to reference quoted material or additional material.
