Grading Criteria:

Online Discussions (worth 20 points each (Total- 100 points))

Students are expected to participate in a discussion of the material covered in your textbook and lectures. You can find the discussion forum by going to the Discussion Board module tab (left side of screen)

The first week's forum consist of an Self- Introduction posting plus the Module One assignment posting. During each module, you should have a total of three postings:

- 1) In your first posting, you will be asked to answer one of two question given. With each question, you are also asked to give your thoughts on how this event or issue relates to what is happening in our country today. In other words, showing how some events or issues happening in history can cause issues in our country today. Each week you will either answer the question(s) posted for your thread or you may be required to come up with your own thoughts on the reading material for that Module. You will be using outside sources, so make sure to reference where you got the information.
- 2) Make sure to also respond to at least two of your classmates.

Grading Requirements:

1. If you meet all the requirements meaning, you have created your thread or initial post and answered two of your classmates plus followed the guidelines such as 150-200 word post written in a scholarly form for the initial post and answered two of your classmates in a scholarly form, you will receive 20 points.
2. The initial 150-200 word post is worth 10 points. With your initial posting, you are required to use an outside source so make sure to cite your sources. The two posts to your classmates are worth 5 points each. (This is if you have written the posts in a scholarly fashion)
3. There are no word requirements for the **posts to your classmates**.
4. The comments you write cannot simply say "I agree with you" or "Good post". They must be written in an interesting and informative manner.

Question Sets:

For each module, you will have a question set consisting short answer and essays. (100 points each) The short answer questions relate to key issues from your weekly reading assignment. There will be two mandatory essay questions each week as well as ten short answer questions.

- 10 Short Answer worth 5 points each (total 50 points)
- 2 essay questions worth 25 points each (50 points)

Grading Requirements:

- Short Answer: The responses to these questions should consist of three to five sentences.
- Essay: Each essay is worth 25 points and should be 250-300 words to answer the question(s) fully. Points will be deducted for responses that are short or vague.

- 5 points deducted for short or vague essays (below 250 words or vague essays without a clear direct answer to question(s) being asked)
- 5 points deducted for multiple grammar errors (5 or more errors)

The content to your essays should be clear and in scholarly form. Jargon, lingo and street language are to be avoided. MLA or APA is permissible when quoting material. You will notice with some of the essay questions being asked, you will need to use outside sources, so please make sure to cite your sources.
