# **Syllabus**

**ACC-491:** Accounting Seminar

#### **Course Description**

This course on Accounting Information Systems will look at this area of study through the disciplines of accounting, management, finance, and information systems. The course will be broken out into five parts: AIS fundamentals, documentation techniques, information technology, business processes, and ethics and auditing. Throughout the course there will be a concerted emphasis on critical thinking and professional judgment.

Credit Hours: 3

Prerequisite Courses: ACC-423 and ACC-451.

#### Course Outcomes

Upon completion of this course you should be able to:

- 1. Assess the nature of accounting information systems while developing professional judgment, focusing on the accounting cycle, including different views of ethical thought, and building upon the foundation of internal control.
- 2. Analyze accounting information systems through flowcharting and data flow diagramming.
- 3. Analyze how e-business, computer networking, and system security are affected by information technology.
- 4. Analyze the business processes that affect sales and collections, acquisitions and payments, and other areas of a company.
- 5. Apply the importance of ethics as it relates to accounting information systems and the connection between auditing and accounting information systems.
- 6. Integrate biblical principles related to accounting information systems.
