**REL-483:** Biblical Studies Colloquium

#### **Course Description**

A reading and writing intensive course in the study of Biblically-oriented topics that serves as a capstone experience for Biblical Studies students. Topics may reflect contemporary issues or research in the wider discipline.

#### Credit Hours: 3

Prerequisite Courses: This is the capstone course for the Bachelor's degree in Biblical Studies and should be taken near the end of the program.

Prerequisite Skills and Knowledge: In-depth knowledge of the Inductive Bible Study method and elements of research in Biblical Studies.

#### **Course Outcomes**

Upon completion of this course, you should be able to:

- 1. Demonstrate mastery of the various tools of inductive Bible study.
- 2. Synthesize a major theme of a book of scripture.
- 3. Create a series of Bible study lessons based on a major theme of a book of scripture.
- 4. Interpret a short passage of scripture with extensive use of academic secondary literature.
- 5. Explain several connections between a particular book of scripture and elements of the Wesleyan-Arminian theological tradition.
- 6. Reflect on the relationship of the study of scripture and spiritual formation.
