BIL-404: Acts of the Apostles

Course Description

Primarily a study of the Book of Acts. Attention will be given to the development of the concept of the church, as well as its historical setting in the first two centuries of the Christian era.

Credit Hours: 3

Prerequisite Courses: BIL-202 or BIL-203 or permission of the program director.

- 1. Describe the geography, characters, events, structure, and major themes of the book of Acts.
- 2. Skillfully employ the various tools of Inductive Bible Study on the narratives and speeches of Acts.
- 3. Explain the historical-cultural background of Acts and how it impacts the interpretation of particular passages.
- 4. Formulate key leadership principles taught throughout the book of Acts.
- 5. Analyze the role of either the church or the Holy Spirit across the book of Acts.
- 6. Develop a Bible study lesson focused on either the church or the Holy Spirit in Acts.
