Course Description:

One of the readings we are using this semester (which comes from *Writing about Writing*, 3rd edition) states, "there is not one universal set of rules for writing correctly, but rather many sets of habits adopted by groups of people using particular texts to accomplish particular ends of activities" and "there is no easily transferable set of rules from one writing situation to another. What transfers is not how to write, but what to ask about writing" (Wardle and Downs, 2017, p. 4).

This course seeks to disrupt your assumptions about writing for academic purposes (and other purposes as well). My goal is to challenge you to think about writing as more than an exercise to earn a grade (though it's kind of always that too when we're in a classroom, digital or otherwise); I'm hoping you will come to see writing as one of many forms of communication, an act you take part in on a daily basis and already know a lot about.

- Students taking this course should have access to and be well versed in **Microsoft Word or some other word processing software** and general use of the internet. There are no course prerequisites, however.

- Essays (70%)
 - Essays will make up the bulk of your grade in this course. Writing as a process, including planning and revision, will be stressed.
 - Project 1: Literacy Narrative
 - Intro to threshold concepts and genre theory.
 - Why writing about writing?
 - Writing process, writing is not natural
 - Project 2: Critique Essay
 - Project 3: Profile of a Writer or Writers in a Group
- Discussions and Journal Assignments (5%)

- Multimodal Project (5%)
 - The final project (Project 4) will incorporate media and text into one polished work to be shared with your classmates and possibly other students and faculty at Kettering College.
- Quizzes (5%)
 - Quizzes are always open book; due to this, I expect accuracy and full, complete answers for full credit.
- Source Evaluation (5%)
 - Students will conduct research and evaluate the sources they find. See the assignment for more details.
- General Assignments (10%)
 - Anything that doesn't fit into the other categories falls here, including outlines and writing group activities.
