Discussion Boards

In modules, 2, 4, 6, and 8, you have Discussion Board (DB) assignments. The discussion topics relate to the material covered in the chapter. The instructions and rubric for these assignments are embedded in the submission links in Bb. Each DB assignment is worth 50 points (200 points total).

Leadership Case Study

In module 6, you will complete a case study related to the topic of leadership. The objective of the assignment is to help you recognize, analyze, and solve leadership problems in the real world. You are provided a properly-formatted template/outline, instruction video, rubric, and instructions (embedded in the submission links) in Bb. This assignment it worth 100 points.

GENERAL CLASS POLICIES

Blackboard:

Although this is an online course, there are still expectations of us all as citizens of this forum. Please be respectful of your classmates. Do not use this forum as a means for bullying, name calling, or other forms of discourteous behavior.

Participation:

Online courses can be as robust and engaging as face to face courses. We all have to commit to being active and present in the course. Your presence in the course adds to the experience for everyone. Thus, it is important to participate in the weekly "Live Chats", as well as the discussion boards for this course. Please participate with the general idea and intention to engage, stimulate, and provoke critical thought from your classmates.

Late Assignments:

This is a Competency-Based Course. In part, this means that you can move at your own pace. For the most part, there are no due dates for this course. However, all of the work for this course must be completed by the end date for the course. Additionally, while the Discussion Boards do not have weekly due dates, they must all be completed by the Sunday of Module 7 in this course. This will ensure that you have time to engage, rather than to rush to get the discussions posted.

Communications:

Communication can be a challenge in this format, but if we establish some rules, it can make things much easier. There is no "contact the instructor" forum in this course, because there are better ways to communicate. Most issues can be resolved via text or email. So, the first option should be to text for quick issues, and email for more complex issues. I realize that we

are all on different schedules, so you can text me at anytime. If I am awake, I will usually respond quickly. Sometimes, I will request a phone call or zoom session if the issue requires a richer response. If you contact me, expect a response within 24 hours. If I do not respond within that window, please assume I did not get the message and reach out again. Note that in some situations, I might get inquiries from students that will prompt an announcement or mass emails. These constitute a response. If you are dissatisfied with group response, please reach out again.
