

Learning Opportunities

1. Quizzes

You will have 8 quizzes, one for each module. You can use your book and any notes, but you will only have 1 hour to complete the quiz. Don't try to take the quiz without first doing the reading, the discussion board, and going through the power points. When you take an online quiz, close all other websites and pages. Once you start the quiz you can't save and go back, you must complete it all in one setting.

2. BLACKBOARD WEB PAGE—DISCUSSION BOARDS (8 X 5=40 POINTS total)

You will have 8 discussion boards, and you will choice one of the two for each module. There will be a scenario where a person asks a question in the form of "DEAR BOGEY." You must answer the question not with your own opinion but in a meaningful, helpful way. You must also imbed 2 references into your answer. Please answer the question and also respond to at least two other posts. Impress me by using information from the book, outside references, think critically and creatively, and use appropriate grammar and spelling (it is OK to have some fun too).

3. Individual Journal (50 points)

The Blackboard Journal in this class is a cumulative project that includes 4 main parts components. You will work on this project during the entire class. Just doing the journal is not enough to get the full points, you must put effort and thought into the journal. I STRONLGY SUGGEST YOU WRITE YOUR JOURNALS IN WORD AND THEN COPY THEM INTO THE JOURNALS.

For the Blackboard Journals you must have the following:

a.) A table of contents so I can quickly see what you have included

b.) Four individual entries. Each entry should be approximately 4 paragraphs.

You should include a summary of what you did, what you learned, and your reaction. Each entry MUST include at least 2 references from the book and at least 2 references from outside the book (e.g., another book, article, or website). These references also must be cited in the papers. Include your references at the bottom of your entry.

For example, In the movie Murderball, it shows athletes with disabilities. According to Smith, 2007 on the website www.exceptionalathletes.com, approximately 10% of athletes have a sexual dysfunction.

c.)A conclusion entry of what you learned and how the things all integrate. Prove to me that you learned something valuable in the class and in your portfolio. So you will end up with 6 journal entries (4 entries, the conclusion, and TOC).

You will have one journal entry due (see syllabus) and then the final syllabus at the end.

Movie Summary (Can do up to 3 movies)

Write a summary paper and reaction paper to each video, include 2 references (with page numbers from the text book) and two additional references (journal or website) that relates to each of the videos. Some good human sexuality videos include Crazy Stupid Love, Brokeback Mountain, Transamerica, Normal, Juno, Boys Don't Cry, Philadelphia, Angels in America, Lars and the Real Girl, Philadelphia, Milk, The Kids are Alright, Easy A, The Crying Game, and Kinsey. If you have another movie idea, post it on Bb and I will approve or not.

Observation/Community Service (only one)

You can participate in any service project sponsored by the center for public service. It is great if you are doing other service at home, at your church, for your grandma, etc. But this has to be something sponsored and verified by the CPS. Write a summary paper and reaction paper, include 2 references (with page numbers from the text book) and two additional references (journal or website) that relates to your experience. Note, the experience must have enough sexual or gender related information for you to make it work for this class.

Get involved at McK: Speaker, Brown Bag, or Play (two)

Write a summary paper and reaction paper, include 2 references (with page numbers from the text book) and two additional references (journal or website) that relate to your experience with the speaker or event...sometimes you have to be a bit creative to find links to sexuality, gender, love, etc.

"AHA" Critical incident moment reflection and additional research Paper (only one)

Hopefully there will be moments in the class where you will learn something particularly exciting, surprising, or personally relevant. Do some more research on this topic, write a paper, include 2 references from the book, and two additional references.

ALL IN THE FAMILY—FAMILY INTERVIEW (only one)

I think it is interesting to share class information with our friends and family and to get to know our family members on a deeper level. Pick a family member (mom, dad, grandpa, aunt, cousin, etc) who has an interesting story to tell about dating, gender, marriage, divorce, sexuality, or pregnancy. For this paper include the questions you asked and the responses. Also include at least two references from the book and two outside references. After the actual questions and responses include a summary of your experiences. I prefer the interviews are done in person but they could be phone interviews (but not emails or texting—you need the flexibility to ask questions and get to know each other).



4.) Individual Current Event Blog (20 points)

Sex, Gender, and Love in the NEWS! On our shared class Blog, each student will have to post a summary overview and reaction post about something that is currently happening in the news (and something that is "big" enough that most people have heard about it), include 2 references (with page numbers from the text book) and two additional reference (journal or website) that relates to the news event. Each student must also comment to at least 5 other Blogs. Once one person posts on a current event, you can't also do that event unless something significant and new happens. In other words, each Blog post will be about something unique. The current events have to happen AFTER the start of the class. In the title of your BLOG, include the date and brief news story (e.g., September 25, Tiger Woods attends sex addiction rehab.) This should be a NEWS story not just a research study or something that pops up on MSN (e.g., cheating is bad for marriage). Do NOT plagiarize and simply copy from a website, you MUST write in your own words!

5. EDUCATION & WIKI (50 points)

One of the most important aspects of this class is learning to communicate with others about sexual issues and relationships. I will put you in teams based on interest to brainstorm about a an education program you could do. Then individually you will find a church, a school, a youth group, a womens' club, a local health club, etc. to provide an educational event for. You will need to prepare a brief proposal on the blackboard page of what you will do, where you will do your talk, when you will do your talk, who will be the audience (include ages), and finally what you plan to do. Then you will post a brief summary of how your education went. The team wiki will just allow you to brainstorm ideas with other class members. A wiki is just a shared space where you can create a document and brainstorm. You will create your outline using the Blackboard Wiki and create the following headings:

TEAMS/GROUPS/COLLABORATION

Tips for the GROUP WIKI project:

Yes, I KNOW that working in groups is challenging. But it is also really important to learn to work in groups, especially in a psychology class. Here are some tips to help your groups succeed.

- 1. Go to the GROUP button (group for wiki and group db) and go to the group discussion board and say what parts/jobs you will do. For example, "I will do the 5 websites", "I will find 2 photos", etc.
- 2. Then go to the Group button and click on the "WIKI" link and you can go post on that page. It is just a shared page that you can add everything you need. The neat thing is everybody can edit it. A Wiki is just a shared page. (Think Wikipedia!) This is our own little Wikipedia page just for our class.

7. Professionalism and Participation:
