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ONLINE BIO3 Lab Syllabus

Spring 2019, Session 2

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COURSE DESCRIPTION

This introductory microbiology online lab focuses on standard microbiology techniques including the use of the microscope, specimen staining, culturing of bacterial cells and application of biochemical tests for the identification of microorganisms through the use of the online lab simulation program "Late Nite Labs" and instructional videos.

COURSE LEARNING OUTCOMES

The objectives for the lab are:

- 1. To learn how to use a brightfield light microscope to view and interpret slides
- 2. To learn how to prepare and stain bacteria on slides for visualization and characterization
- 3. To learn how to apply aseptic techniques for the transfer and handling of microorganisms
- 4. To learn how to test various microbiological systems through the use of appropriate media
- 5. To be able to analyze, interpret, and present data

Assessment of Student Learning Outcomes

Student learning is at the core of the MSMU mission. COURSE REQUIREMENTS

- Time Requirements. This is a 1-credit-hour course and will require approximately 6 hours of focused effort
 every week over the 8-week course schedule to be completed successfully. Please schedule time for this
 course, along with other courses and individual responsibilities you may have accordingly.
- Adaptive & Project-Based. This course uses a combination of individualized, adaptive learning, and project-based learning strategies. As such, you will be expected to actively engage with the content of the course regularly.
- You are required to demonstrate mastery of the concepts and terms presented within the course. You will
 demonstrate mastery by completing a series of quizzes and assignments designed to help you improve
 your proficiency with the terminology, concepts and skills presented in the course content.
- Participation & Engagement. You are expected to fully engage with your instructor and the content of the course. Doing so will make your learning experience more effective, more enjoyable, and ultimately, more successful.
- Project. You will complete 8 Labs for this course, one of which will involve completing a written lab report.
- Writing expectations. This is a rigorous, college-level course and you are expected to write at the college
 level in all of your assignments. Failure to proofread submissions for spelling and grammar will result in a
 significantly lower grade.

Final Exam (30%) and Lab Midterm (25%): Exams will be proctored through **Examity** and given through CANVAS on the scheduled dates. You will need to schedule your time to take the exam through Examity. (Read the Examity information pdf file to set up your profile if you have not used it before.) You will be given an allotted period of time to complete the exam once you begin. The exam, including any incomplete

questions will be automatically submitted at the end of the time period. YOU MAY NOT USE THE INTERNET OR YOUR NOTES FOR THE EXAMS.

If you miss an exam, a make-up will be granted <u>under the following conditions only</u>: a doctor's note stating that you could not attend class on a given date due to illness, notification from the dean of a death in the family, or an official school function with a note from the faculty/staff in charge. You must contact me within <u>24 hours</u> of missing an exam to schedule a make-up test.

Canvas Quizzes (20%): 7 timed quizzes will be posted on Canvas as noted in the syllabus (subject to change) and must be taken by 11:59pm of the due date posted in the syllabus to test your understanding of the material from the previous week. Once you begin, you will be given the allotted time period to complete the quiz. Make sure that you study the labs ahead of time and ensure that you have enough time to take the quiz so that you can complete it, as there will be no make ups for missed quizzes. Any quizzes missed due to legitimate reasons (such as grave illness or hospitalization), will result in your lowest quiz score counted twice. Any further missed quizzes will receive a zero. Each quiz will be posted for 24 hours to allow for each student to take the quiz when the time is convenient.

To study for the quizzes, you must review background information for each lab, watch any posted videos, be familiar with important lab techniques and important reagents, be able to interpret lab results and complete all lab exercise questions. The Canvas quiz will only cover the Module of the previous week.

Late Nite Labs Assignment and Quiz (20%): 8 Late Nite Labs must be completed through the Late Nite Lab website during this course. You will be responsible for completing the labs weekly and submitting the questions and quizzes at the end of each lab before the deadline. Feel free to work ahead if you can - some of the labs are short, some will take more time. The labs will close after the due date. Completing the labs ON TIME for the entire semester will result in full participation points (50pts) that will be added to the Late Nite Lab Category.

Unknown Lab Report (5%): You will be required to write an <u>Unknown Lab Report</u> based on your experiments from the Unknown Lab (Lab #8). You should complete the lab early so that you will have time to write your report. Use the posted handout as a guide.

Assignment grading expectations.

All assignments are expected to be turned in by midnight of the due dates stated in the syllabus and course calendar. With the exception of the lab reports, your instructor will grade and give feedback to assignments within about 24-48 hours of your submission.

Late or missing assignments

All assignments and exams listed in the syllabus must be submitted in order to earn a passing grade in the course. Assignments and assessments are due according to the course schedule and syllabus. All students are expected to plan their time and energies so that course work can be completed and submitted on time.

If an emergency, medical or personal obstacle prevents you from meeting assignment expectations, **you must contact your instructor as early as possible**. At your instructor's discretion, assignments may be accepted after the due date, though late penalties may be assessed to your score. Except in extreme cases (as determined by your instructor), an assignment that is more than one week late will be accepted and will receive feedback, but will earn zero points towards your grade.

Due Dates and Times

Remember to check your time zone in the Canvas system. You can do this by clicking settings in the top right corner, then checking it in the center part of the page. All due date times are 11:59 pm in Pacific Time. This means that if you are in a different time zone, the due date may appear to be later, since 11:59 pm PT on Wednesday is 12:59 am Mountain Time on Thursday, 1:59 Central Time on Thursday, and 2:59 Eastern Time on Thursday.

You may want to set your time zone in the Canvas system to Pacific Time. Then, you will always see the correct due date, and you do not need to worry about converting time zones.

Policy on Incompletes

An incomplete in a course can be granted only when a student has fulfilled the majority of the course requirements, has a passing grade in course work, is prevented from completing the assigned work for serious medical/personal reasons, and can, in the opinion of the instructor, complete the work within one eight-week session.
