Course Materials

Course Textbook Notice: Beginning August 31, MSMU Online Fall 1 Session students will be responsible for purchasing course textbooks. Course Description

Completion with a grade of C (2.0) or better and a score of 4 or better on the Writing Exit test fulfills Communication Skills requirement in writing for both the Associate and Baccalaureate degrees. Principles and practice of writing with attention to analytical reading. Includes discussion skills, library usage, research techniques, and an introduction to literature. *Completion with a grade of C or better*.

This course takes "a world of ideas" as a springboard to spark and refine your college writing skills. With a focus on foundational readings for first-year college students, it will introduce a wide range of ideas that have preoccupied humankind for the past 2,000 years, ideas focusing on government, justice, the individual, wealth and poverty, the mind, and gender and culture. Students will learn to write eloquently and critically about these ideas, documenting their sources to enhance their academic integrity. The course will help develop and organize a toolbox of communication skills, focusing on crafting clear, concise, and compelling writing based on academic research. You will analyze non-fiction and one novel, crafting logical and coherent arguments using the research process, establishing appropriate tone, and employing correct grammar. This course is designed to prepare you for success in college and the job market where clear writing and critical thinking are prized.

Course Learning Outcomes

- 1. Apply the research process, developing arguments with support and evidence.
- 2. Develop writing that has content, organization, style, and grammar.
- 3. Recognize assumptions, their underlying values, as well as develop and assess arguments.
- 4. Recognize and analyze power dynamics and articulate different methods for changing distributive injustices.
- 5. Identify individual and group behavior in society.
- 6. Document research using MLA format.

Assessment of Student Learning Outcomes

Student learning is at the core of the Mount Saint Mary's University (MSMU) mission. MSMU faculty developed a plan to assess the student-learning outcomes that represent the knowledge, skills and attitudes expected of a college student in your major. In this class one or more student learning outcomes will be assessed. Some of our class assignments may be used to evaluate overall student learning and to improve teaching and learning in this class, this department, and throughout the University.

Course Requirements

- Time Requirements. This is a 3-credit-hour course and will require approximately 18 hours of focused
 effort every week over the 8-week course schedule to be completed successfully. If you think about it, this
 course is a half-time job that will require significant work and attention on your part. Please schedule time
 for this course, along with other courses and individual responsibilities you may have accordingly.
- Adaptive & Problem-Based. This course uses a combination of individualized, adaptive learning, and problem-based learning strategies. As such, you will be expected to actively engage with the content of the course individually and also to collaborate actively with your classmates every week.
- Mastery. You are required to demonstrate mastery of the concepts and terms presented within the course.
 You will demonstrate mastery by completing a series of quizzes and assignments designed to help you improve your proficiency with the terminology, concepts and skills presented in the course content.
- Participation & Engagement. You are expected to fully engage with your classmates, your instructor and the content of the course. Full engagement requires that you log into the online system and communicate meaningfully with your classmates several days each week. Doing so will make your learning experience more effective, more enjoyable, and ultimately, more successful.
- *Project.* There are several significant writing projects in this course, some of which are individual products and others are collaborative efforts. Your collaborative work from week to week will be shared with the class publicly and will be evaluated by your peers and by your instructor at the end of the course.
- Library resources. Information Literacy is an essential learning outcome of the college. As such, you are expected to access and appropriately use library resources available through the <u>MSMU Library</u> (http://www.msmc.la.edu/academics/libraries.asp) site online. Because this is your foundational writing class, we will spend extra time presenting library resources and helping you utilize and cite them appropriately. Throughout your program of study you will be required to use library resources in individual and group projects.
- Writing expectations. This is your foundational college writing class. It is a rigorous, college-level course and you are expected to write at the college level in all of your assignments. Failure to proofread submissions for spelling and grammar will result in a significantly lower grade being assigned.

All assignments are expected to be turned in by midnight of the due dates stated in the syllabus and course calendar. Your instructor will grade and give feedback to assignments within 48 hours of your submission, or the next business day. The exceptions to this timeline are for large group projects, which will be returned within 72 hours.

- Be patient and read the comments of other group members thoroughly before entering your remarks.
- Be positive and constructive in group discussions.
- Respond in a thoughtful and timely manner.

Late or missing assignments

All assignments and exams listed in the syllabus must be submitted in order to earn a passing grade in the course. Assignments and assessments are due according to the course schedule and syllabus. All students are expected to plan their time and energies so that course work can be completed and submitted on time.

If an emergency, medical or personal obstacle prevents you from meeting assignment expectations, you must contact your instructor as early as possible. At your instructor's discretion, assignments may be accepted after the due date, though late penalties may be assessed to your score. Except in extreme cases (as determined by your instructor), an assignment that is more than one week late will be accepted and will receive feedback, but will earn zero points towards your grade.

Late/Make up Work: Assignments cannot be made up unless arrangements have been made.

If an assignment is submitted late, the following grading chart will be used:

Example: If submitted one day late (within the first week), the highest score possible is a 90.

Due Dates and Times

Remember to check your time zone in the Canvas system. You can do this by clicking settings in the top right corner, then checking it in the center part of the page. All due date times are 11:59 pm in Pacific Time. This means that if you are in a different time zone, the due date may appear to be later, since 11:59 pm PT on Wednesday is 12:59 am Mountain Time on Thursday, 1:59 Central Time on Thursday, and 2:59 Eastern Time on Thursday.

You may want to set your time zone in the Canvas system to Pacific Time. Then, you will always see the correct due date, and you do not need to worry about converting time zones.

Policy on Incompletes

An incomplete in a course can be granted only when a student has fulfilled the majority of the course requirements, has a passing grade in course work, is prevented from completing the assigned work for serious medical/personal reasons, and can, in the opinion of the instructor, complete the work within one eight-week session.
