Course Description:	<p>A working knowledge of business law is important to every member of society, as the law applies to us all --- from individuals to organizations. This course is a broad introduction to U.S. law, concentrating on basic knowledge of the legal system and its impacts on commerce. Business Law begins with an overview of the judicial system and alternative dispute resolution. After a brief look at criminal law and civil liability, we focus on contracts, the Uniform Commercial Code (UCC), business formation, agency relationships and intellectual property. This course will also introduce students to ethical constructs and ethics-based decision making.</p>
Course Competencies and Learning Outcomes:	<p>Competency 1: Develop an understanding of the origins of the American legal system, sources of law, the lawsuit process, and the difference between criminal and civil law.</p> <p>Competency 2: Understand the basics of contract law including how contracts are made, what makes an agreement enforceable, when a contract has to be in writing, and what happens when a contract is broken.</p> <p>Competency 3: Understand how the Uniform Commercial Code (UCC) makes contract formation and enforcement different when agreements are between businesses rather than individuals.</p> <p>Competency 4: Comprehend and explain the legal impacts of employer/employee relationships, warranties, and intellectual property upon a business.</p>

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Late work:	This course is designed for you to proceed at your own pace. However, I urge you to take the pretest for the first competency during the first three days of class and to progress at an accelerated rate. Unlike most traditional college programs, the courses in this program last 7-weeks, which means that it is easy to fall behind. In order to avoid this, allocate sufficient time to complete all work in an efficient and qualitative manner, so that you are able to pass all four post-tests within the time allowed.								
Time commitment:	Online courses are typically just as time intensive, and may be more rigorous, than traditional courses. Many students claim that online courses require more time and commitment. As you begin this course, you would be wise to schedule 8 or more hours per week for studying materials and completing assignments. Falling behind in this course is particularly problematic because the concepts we cover are cumulative. This means that not becoming proficient with information and objectives presented and assessed in a particular week can lead to low scores for that week as well as in subsequent weeks.								
Class Participation:	<p>Online courses require your active participation. Here are some tips for success:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • In courses with discussion forums, you learn from one another by posting questions, justifying your comments, and providing multiple perspectives. When you prepare for discussions through thoughtful reflection, you contribute to your own successful learning experience as well as to the experience of your peers. • Log in to the course frequently (at least several times per week for long semesters and daily for summer sessions) and check your email as I will be sending weekly emails, as well as post Announcements. This will keep you apprised of any course updates, progress in discussions, assignment information, and messages requiring immediate attention. • Be aware of and keep up with the Course Schedule in the Syllabus.
