# CJUS 430, Professionalism and Ethics in Criminal Justice, Syllabus (3 credits)

## **COURSE DESCRIPTION**

Inherent in the criminal justice system is the power to make discretionary decisions of great magnitude that affect the offenders, victims, and society. This is a study of theories and practices of legality, morality, values, and ethics as they pertain and are applied in criminal justice. Included are such topics as police corruption, excessive use of force, and methods of dealing with such practices in the context of professional conduct.

## Attendance
