HUS 340 GROUP SKILLS IN THE HUMAN SERVICES

Course Description:

Group Skills for the Human Services explores the different stages of groups; group structures, organization, and examines the functions of groups. Students will learn about the different types of groups, their purpose, and ethical and multicultural issues found in all types of groups. Additionally, students will learn how to use specific skills in the various stages of group work. In this course, there is a heavy emphasis on experiential learning processes where students learn about group processes via group exercises in class.

- 6. Dramatize group sessions to demonstrate effective group facilitation techniques and an ability to build rapport with group members.
- 7. Describe and recognize member based defense mechanisms.

8. Demonstrate the ability to plan, implement, co-lead, and critique a structured group activity.
