Making Sense of the Sound: The Art of Listening Well to Great Music

## **Course Description:**

What is music? Why do humans do music? How can one make heads or tails of a musical performance, and why are we so fascinated by it? In this course students will develop critical listening skills through increasing their understanding of musical structure and cultural context and making connections between musical masterpieces of the past and the music that they enjoy in the present. The focus of the course is European and North American music, sprinkled with musical styles from non-Western locales.

## **Learning Outcomes:**

By the end of this course, students will be able to:

- 1. Apply knowledge of terms, styles, elements, and devices through analysis of creative and artistic works demonstrating critical listening skills by distinguishing different music elements within a composition and discerning the organizational structure of a piece through Role of Music Essay, Elements of Music Post, Musical Blueprint, Research Paper and & Presentation, Concert Critique and Exams. **CL2**
- 2. Analyze the contributions of creative minds to the visual, literary, and performing arts by examining music's role in in different aspects of society such as religion, politics, social structure, and entertainment through Musical Taste Interview, Music History Group Assignment and Presentation, Protest or Unification Song Post, Research Paper and Presentation Rubric Concert Critique and Exams. **CL1**
- 3. Communicate effectively while delivering coherent presentations featuring correct information and evidence by analyzing one aspect of great music or a composer in depth and describing its (his/her) development or origins and impact on the evolution of the music that followed in a Music History Group Project and Research Paper and Presentation. **CC2**
- 4. This course will stress the personal development of the student's own knowledge of great music. The student will gain a greater understanding of music's role in society and an appreciation of how and why musical styles have changed and evolved over time through Role of Music Essay, Elements of Music Post and Research Paper and Presentation. Personal Development
- 5. Students will examine how music has been an effective tool throughout history for building community in a variety of ways. Students will experience community through working together on group projects and presentations through Elements of Music Post, Protest or Unification Song Post and Research Paper and Presentation. #### Assessments:

1. Two Exams (30% of grade) - Learning Outcomes: 1 & 2

On these exams students will be asked to demonstrate critical listening skills through responses to listening examples, critical thinking skills through essay questions, and knowledge of key elements of course content through matching, multiple choice, or short answer questions.

2. Research Paper and PowerPoint presentation (25% of grade)- Learning Outcomes: 1-5

On a topic approved by the instructor; 5 pages double spaced using MLA format.

3. Class Assignments (25% of the grade) - Learning Outcomes: 1, 2, & 3

These assignments include written reflections on musical examples, participation in group discussion and presentation, and demonstrations of musical style through original or student researched music compositions.

4. Concert Critique (15% of the grade) - Learning Outcomes: 1 & 3

Must be a live concert attended during current semester, not previous semester or year.

5. Do Frist Discussion Participation (5%) - Learning Outcomes 1-5

Students must post an original posting to the discussion board by Thursday at 11:59 EST/EDT each week and respond to at least two of their classmates by Sunday at 11:59 EST/EDT to receive a **PASS** grade for this assignment.
