REL450 History of Christianity

Course Description:

This course is an inquiry into the theological, spiritual, and institutional history of Christianity from the time of Christ to the present.

Quizzes: Modules 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, and 8 will have a timed essay quiz covering the required reading in the textbook and other assigned readings. The purpose of these essay questions is to assess how well you have done the reading assignments and understand the material. Your answers must reflect knowledge of the assigned reading and the ability to express it in your own words. Once you begin the quiz, you will have an hour to answer five essay questions.

Discussion Questions: Discussion posts should reflect careful and critical reflection on the discussion question as it relates to the content of the module and module reading assignments. It is not sufficient to restate the question or make comments that do not address the question directly.

Reflection: A personal reflection on the relevance of each module's content to contemporary Christianity should be submitted to the Assignment box no later than Sunday 11:59 PM EST/EDT of each module. The purpose of this exercise is to learn how to discover in historical events and ideas a contemporary relevance for the modern Church. You are being asked to reflect in no less than 150 words on how the historical material of each module can provide some insight, lesson, or perspective for Christianity today. While you will not receive a specific grade for each entry, the assignment is pass-fail; therefore, you must meet the following minimum requirements to receive credit.

- 1) 150 word minimum
- 2) Clear and logical expression
- 3) Related to the historical material

The completion of the journal assignments for all eight modules will count for 10% of the final grade.

Research Paper: Historical study requires a great deal of objectivity. Be careful to thoroughly research your chosen topic, and use ample sources. If you choose to conduct research in the New Testament, remember that your topic should be of an historical nature and approached from that perspective. Please consult with your instructor on the theme of your paper. The research paper is a place to show excellence in conducting historical research, insightful analysis, and clear, accurate communication of ideas. Papers that *only* meet the minimum requirements described above will fall short of the standard of excellence and be graded accordingly.

The research paper requires MLA formatting, 1500 words, double-spaced pages at 12-point font (including a separate cover page and works cited page), and five (5) sources from any of the following: book, print journal, online peer reviewed journal, and/or website with an .edu address. Wikipedia will not be accepted as a resource for this course. Wikipedia does not qualify as an acceptable resource; the nature of a wiki allows experts and nonexperts alike to contribute to the content. See the Research Paper Guidelines document for complete guidelines, rubric, and checklist for this assignment.

The topic of your paper must be submitted to the instructor via the Assignment box for approval by the end of Module 2. The research paper must be submitted to the Assignment box by the end of Module 7. (The Assignment box is linked to Turnitin.)
