Practicing Sociology

Course Description:

This course serves as an introduction to the practice of sociology in a variety of settings. It is designed to expose students to the professional worlds of sociologists. Students will learn how sociological concepts, skills and tools may be used to analyze and change contemporary social behavior and issues. They will become familiar with the uses of the discipline through a review of sociology in practical affairs, simulations, case studies, and from professionals.

Exams (18%)

There will be a mid-term and a final exam during the semester. Exams will cover all materials from class and include essay questions, along with multiple choice, and short answer questions. Each examination is worth 9% of the total grade.

Sociologists in Action Projects 18%

In teams, students will choose 2-4 of the “Suggestions for Specific Actions” from the required textbook for implementation. Students should develop a written implementation plan for each chosen “Action” and present it to the class for feedback, before engaging in the “Action”. Instructors must review and approve implementation plans for all “Actions” before students may act on them.

Each team will write a report on its work, summarizing the planning and execution of each “Action”, noting the role of all team members, and any discernible impact of their activities. For reporting, students should document activities leading up to their “Actions” – as well as the “Actions” themselves. Documentation should include notes, but may also include photographs and videos. Students must adhere to privacy rules of organizations they work with and follow their guidelines as they create their reports. Students should seek authorization to take pictures, and should protect individuals’ privacy. Taking pictures of minors is discouraged. Documentation should not invade the privacy of others.

Think Tank Simulation 9%

Each team will choose one of their Sociologists in Action Projects and create a Think Tank on that issue. The Think Tank will build on the project by presenting their work to relevant parties with expertise/authority/influence on the issue or to the class. If the Think Tank is presenting to an out-of-class entity, they might for example, address University Campus issues to other students, faculty or administrators. Some topics might be appropriately reviewed by community agencies.

Using Sociology Report 18%

Sociological tools can be used in a variety of professions. For this assignment, describe the working life of a professional sociologist, of your choice. You may gather this information from the internet, books, videos, or in-person conversations, once approval has been granted by the instructor. Next, describe how you might use your sociological training in your own career. Submit a typed 5 page report, (double-spaced, including a title page and a reference page), and formatted in ASA style. The report will be submitted to Turnitin.com.

Field Consultant Project 18%

Visit a professional individual and offer yourself as a "consultant" to the person. During your meeting you will present to them how sociology could provide insights, ideas, and relevance to their field of work. This person must be approved in advance by the instructor. Possibilities include educators, business persons, clergy and religious figures, urban planners, economists, and government/political leaders. These are merely suggestions. The point is to stress to this person how sociological knowledge can help them, and in turn, how the discipline of sociology could be enlightened by the types of work and activity he or she is involved in. (Readings will provide examples of applying sociology in a number of fields and settings.) Using Prezi or PowerPoint, all students will present a 10 minute report to the class about their experiences. In addition students will submit a typed 5 page report, (double-spaced, including a title page and a reference page), and formatted in ASA style. The report will be submitted to Turnitin.com.

Portfolio 10%

Over the course of the semester, students will connect their lives, the University, and possibility the wider community, to sociological knowledge about a number of social issues. Each student will produce a portfolio demonstrating his or her application of sociological tools in an effort to influence society by including revised versions of all reports (Using Sociology Report, Field Consultant Report, Sociologists in Action Report). In addition, students should add a one page

report on their Think Tank experience along with at least one page providing an overview of what the discipline of sociology has to offer.

Participation/Discussion Board 9%

To assess class participation, students may be asked to complete short reaction papers, discussion board posts or other activities.
