Course Description

This course introduces the legal principles and US court system which applies to normal business transactions including contracts, torts, property, business structure, and important employment laws.

Course Overview

In this course, we will discuss several areas of law, including the Foundation of U.S. Law, Agency Law, Compliance, Torts, Employment Law, and Contract Law. In each of these six areas, we will explore how they directly corelate to business law and compliance.

Course Workload

Time spent on course assignments will vary by student depending on familiarity with course content, reading rate of speed, writing rate of speed, and other individual factors. Based on averages for most students, it is estimated that the course workload estimate for this course is 44.72 (5.59 hours per week).
