## **Course Description**

This course analyzes the Latter Prophets in the Old Testament, which includes the prophetic books of Isaiah, Jeremiah, and Ezekiel. Emphases are placed upon eras and locations of writing, specifically the Assyrian, Babylonian, and Persian periods, the analyses of texts, and key applications of each of the prophets. The professor may overview all of this literature or emphasize one or more specific books.

#### **Course Overview**

The Latter Prophets course introduces students to the prophetic literature of the Old Testament. The course focuses on the books of Isaiah, Jeremiah, Ezekiel, Daniel. Some consideration is given to historical-critical issues (such as authorship, historical and biographical background), but the primary emphasis is upon literary characteristics and theological significance of these four books.

### **Course Workload**

Time spent on course assignments will vary by student depending on familiarity with course content, reading rate of speed, writing rate of speed, and other individual factors. Based on averages for most students, it is estimated that the course workload estimate for this course **is 10 hours per week.**

### **Description**

Each student will create a VLOG and post a 3-minutes video that responds to each week's prompt. The video must be accompanied by a VLOG script. The VLOG script must (1) have a title (the purpose of the prompt question(s) is to guide your VLOG and should not be the title of your VLOG), (2) demonstrate your interaction with all of this module's resources, (3) be single spaced, (4) one page in length, and (5) employ appropriate grammar, the standard Turabian citation format, and have well connected paragraphs. The VLOG post should be made each week by Saturday at 11:59 p.m. EST.

In addition to the initial post, students must respond substantially to a minimum of two of their peers' initial posts (100-word minimum for each reply). These posts must add breadth and depth to the discussion, continue to build on the initial post, and add additional insights and questions. These posts should be made each week by Tuesday at 11:59 p.m. EST.

### **Description**

Students must write an 8-10 page (2000-2500 words), typewritten (double-spaced) term paper, conforming to the instructions provided to you.
