Course Description

A study of the nature, causes, and treatment of abnormal behavior including personality disorders, neuroses, psychoses, stress reaction and other dysfunctions. Elements contributing to mental health and well-integrated personality are also considered.

Course Overview

Through this course students will be able to define abnormal behavior as well as identify the key characteristics and causes of the many different psychological disorders. Students will also develop and understanding of the diagnostic procedures as well as the different treatment methods available for treating mental illness.

Course Workload

Time spent on course assignments will vary by student depending on familiarity with course content, reading rate of speed, writing rate of speed, and other individual factors. Based on averages for most students, it is estimated that the course workload estimate for this course is 65.68 (8.21 hours per week).

Description

Psychological Disorder Research Paper

Description

For your final paper, you are going to research a psychological disorder of your choice in order to fully understand the disorder. Your paper should cover the following points:

- Prevalence of the disorder
- Symptomology
- Etiology
- DSM-V diagnostic criteria
- What differentiates the diagnosis of this disorder from other disorders in the same diagnostic category
- Current recommended treatments including strengths, weaknesses, and population best suited to for each treatment option
- Prognosis, specifically discussing how this disorder will affect the person throughout the remainder of their life
- Impact on family and friends
- Culture-related issues, culturally bound symptoms, or cultural biases that will affect treatment

Make sure to use headings throughout your paper to clearly organize it.

This paper should be a total of five to seven pages, double-spaced, and written in proper APA format. In addition to the minimum page count (i.e., five pages and one line minimum), you should also include a cover page and a reference page in APA format. Additionally, use a minimum of three additional sources in addition to your textbook to support your points.
