COURSE DESCRIPTION

Explores strategies of community policing and ways to manage police work when it conflicts with constituencies within the community. Prerequisite: CRJS 2253.

OBJECTIVES AND OUTCOMES

Upon completion of the course, students will be able to:

- Recall and describe the evolution of police-community relations and its impact on the police system as assessed by discussion and weekly assignments.
- Describe and compare agency cultures in relationship to community relations as assessed by discussion.
- Discover workable solutions to community problems using various problem solving methods as assessed by a writing assignment.
- Construct effective crime prevention strategies and plans with modifications to those that are currently ineffective as assessed by discussion.
- Determine what constitutes "best practice" in programmatic delivery of police services to the community as assessed by weekly assignments and discussion.
- Demonstrate competency in writing succinct summary papers using the APA citation style as assessed by various writing assignments.

PROCEDURES FOR ACADEMIC DISHONESTY

The following is a summary of the procedures for dealing with acts of academic dishonesty. If there is evidence of academic dishonesty (cheating, plagiarism, or misuse of another's intellectual property) either by voluntary confession, report of another student, or on the basis of work submitted, the faculty member will:

- Notify the provost.
- Implement the appropriate discipline for the student's response, inform the student of the right to appeal, and report the discipline implemented in writing to the provost.
 - o student's unprompted confession NC or 0 for work involved
 - \circ admission after confrontation by faculty member NC or 0 on work and 10% course-grade reduction
 - o denial of guilt and faculty member believes innocence no penalty
 - o denial of guilt but faculty member believes guilt F for the course

• In the event that there is evidence the student either encouraged others to be involved in the academic dishonesty, or conspired with others in the process by giving, receiving or using unauthorized aid, the faculty member will consult with his or her academic dean and recommend to the provost a response which may include academic dismissal from the university.

- **A = Advanced**: The student has gone beyond the simple mastery of the course objectives. He or she can integrate the concepts presented with previously learned material as appropriate to the course. In addition, key ideas can be applied in new and complex settings bringing fresh insights and creativity. Work is of consistently high quality.
- **B = Proficient:** The student has gained competence with respect to the course objectives and is able to satisfactorily apply concepts most of the time. Work is of moderate to high quality.
- **C = Basic:** The student performs adequately in relation to most of the course objectives. There may be some areas of weakness and he or she sometimes applies ideas incorrectly or incompletely. Work is of moderate quality with some inconsistency.
- **D = Below Basic:** The student has minimal grasp of the course objectives. Many important concepts are only partially mastered and he or she struggles to make adequate application. The quality of work is inconsistent and/or marginal.

Each week there will be a variety of embedded assignments for the assigned chapter in MindTap. Together these will account for 50% of your grade.

Discussion 30%

You will participate in regular discussions throughout the course. Your initial response should be at least 2 paragraphs of 5-8 sentences each. You should also post at least one reply to a fellow student of at least one paragraph of 5-8 sentences. Replies should move the conversation along rather than simply agreeing or disagreeing without providing any substantive response. The initial response should be completed by Sunday at 11:59PM of the assigned week. Your replies should be posted by Sunday at 11:59PM on the following week.

Essay 1 10%

This essay will examine a specific issue in police-community relations. For this assignment, you will identify a real-life issue that is important to your home community. Examples could include a pattern of use of force complaints by law enforcement, general mistrust of law enforcement, racial relations, a particular area plagued by criminal activity, poverty, homelessness, gangs, drugs, etc. How can your local law enforcement agency engage with the community to address this issue? Identify community organizations and resources that can be utilized and specific steps that can be taken. Also, identify any possible barriers to your plan and what steps can be taken to overcome them. This paper should be at least 3-5 pages and should be formatted in APA.

Essay 2 10%

The second essay will be a self-reflection addressing each of the following topics:

- What do I know now that I did not know at the beginning of the course?
- In what ways has my understanding of the criminal justice system challenged as a result of the this course?
- How can I apply what I have learned as a practitioner within the criminal justice system?
- What impact can a Christian world view have on the future of the criminal justice system in light of the issues addressed in the course?
- In what ways have I grown as a result of this course? Academically? Professionally? Emotionally? Spiritually?

This paper should be at least 3-5 pages and should be formatted in APA.
