Sex, Courtship & Marriage

Course Description

This course will look at changing values on sexuality, dating and marriage in current culture. Morality, Gender, Sexuality,

Marriage, Dating, Divorce, Parenting and Abortion are areas to be considered. The major thrust of the course will be to challenge students to evaluate their views on these topics, and grow those views with a more well developed rationale and understanding of multiple perspectives. All content will be presented and discussed within a Christian worldview, however students are encouraged to think about and evaluate other worldviews as well.

Mid-Term and Final Exam

Tests will be essay format. The test will be open notes/book, however they will be timed. Tests will cover the material from the assigned readings and group discussion.

Module Reflections

For each module you will submit a 500 word reflection on the readings, supplemental materials and group discussion. This is not simply a summary but demonstrates that you actively engaged in those discussions, considered the viewpoints of your classmates and have worked to evaluate your thinking on these topics. Your reflection should include at least 3 external references not included in the course readings.

Discussions

Your participation in group discussions is required in order to demonstrate your engagement in class. In order to participate in discussions you must read any assigned material before posting to the discussion. Participation involves contributing meaningful, insightful ideas and questions to the

discussion but also requires that you remain respectful and receptive to the thoughts and ideas of others. A variety of viewpoints may be represented in these discussions, I encourage lively debate, but all discussion must be based on sound, supported assertions not merely emotional opinion. Engaging emotionally without logical rationale or support will result in a reduction in your grade.

Students should post an original 250 word response to the group discussion questions posed by Thursday and should respond to at least 2 of their classmates by Sunday. A rubric with more detailed instructions can be found in the assignment on Canvas.

Each student will be assigned as the discussion leader for one module. Leaders will be responsible for posting thought provoking questions to the discussion, moderating group conversations (encouraging students to respond to their classmates or dig deeper in their post). Basically the leader is the professor for this discussion. Leaders will not be required to have a minimum number of posts but instead will be graded on their engagement with classmates and their ability to stimulate good discussion.

Discussion groups will be assigned by the professor and will be a smaller sub-set of the class. The size of these groups will likely range between 5-7 students depending on class size.

Theology of Relationships Paper

You will write a 2000 word paper on YOUR theology of relationships. This paper will be a combination of reflection and research. You will explain your position on what healthy relationships are, the role of gender roles and sexuality in Christian dating/marriage, acceptable and unacceptable sexual behaviors, etc. All research must be appropriately documented and cited within the paper. Please do not cite websites or the readings in your paper. This IS a position paper so you can use first person, however it is not simply your opinion. You should have solid support and logic for your positions on the key issues in relationships

Reading Notes

For EACH module you will write reading notes on the assigned readings. These will be a combination of summary, insight, and reflection. While length is not the only factor to determine completeness, notes should be approximately 1-2 pages of notes for every 10 pages of reading. Completeness will also be evaluated on how adequately the student covered all significant material, their questions or insight on that material and any immediate reflection/response to the material as they read it.

In order to ensure these are your original ideas all notes will be handwritten. Due dates for notes can be found on Canvas. Since they are handwritten you will need to scan and upload your notes into Canvas. Most copies have a scan feature available which will convert your notes to a PDF. However, if you do not have access to a copier/scanner there are several free scanning apps you can download for a smart phone that will convert the images to a PDF as well (I recommend CamScanner (https://www.camscanner.com/).)
