Advanced Social Problems

Course Description

An analysis of the major social problems of contemporary society resulting from technological and social change, population pressure and resources, urbanization, poverty, and minority groups. Special reference is given to conflicts regarding social values and goals, and social disorganization as related to the family, economic, religious, and other institutional relationships.

The course includes subjects that some may regard as sensitive. Students seeking careers in the community services, including counseling, criminal justice, early childhood development, and human services will need to be able to deal with these issues.

This course is a fully online course: it requires independent study, online quizzes and discussion, and one on-one telephone conferences with the instructor each week during class. The syllabus defines weekly sessions that highlight general information on specific social problems that all students are expected to know and include issues related to socio-economic status, public health, women and family, and cumulative social distress. We draw on many online resources available to Southern Wesleyan students to locate books and articles helping us understand these issues.

Course Prerequisites

An introductory course in social science.

Required Materials

There is no required commercial text. Course materials are taken from online sources, or are drawn from materials used in previous courses. Course materials are provided in the Session Overviews in Canvas.

Supplemental Reading

In addition to the required readings, there are supplemental materials included in the course. These readings are intended to round out the information presented in the required readings and provide an additional reference resource. Content from supplemental readings will not be including in the reading quizzes.

Course Learning Outcomes

Students will understand that

- The human services professional must have an understanding of the structure and dynamics of organizations, communities, and society as well as the nature of individuals and groups.
- The demand for services and the funding of educational programs has been closely related to identifiable human conditions including, among others: aging, delinquency, crime, poverty, mental illness, physical illness, chemical dependency, and developmental disabilities. The needs that arise in these conditions provide the focus for the human services profession.
- Human services professionals function as change agents and must therefore attain and develop a core of intervention knowledge, theory, and skills.
- There are values and ethics intrinsic to the human services profession that have been agreed to as governing principles of professional practice.

Weekly On-line Quizzes – 30%

In each session of the course, there will be an online quiz on the articles and chapters that you are expected to read for each session. The online quiz questions may be comprised of true/false, multiple choice, short answer, and matching questions. If a student has read all of the required material, he/she should do well on the quizzes. Quizzes are open book, which means that students may refer to material to complete a quiz. All quizzes will be available and must be completed in Canvas. Quizzes not submitted in this manner will not receive credit. In order to receive credit, quizzes must be completed by designated due dates/times.

Discussion Thoughts – 18%

The discussion thoughts are an opportunity for students to share candidly about the discussion topic listed. Discussions are also an integral part of this course where much of our class integration will take place. Essentially, this is where we will have our class discussions. In a face-to-face course, if someone asked a question, everyone would benefit from hearing the response. Similarly, in the Discussions, our responses to each other will prove useful to all of us. Each student is required to submit an initial posting, and at least 2 responses. Please note you are welcome to post and respond to as many peers as you like, but you are only required to respond to at least 2 peers for credit. As a part of all Discussions, participants are expected to post an original response as well as a response to at least two other contributors. Please avoid responses like, "I agree," or "This was really good." Instead, push yourself to engage in a meaningful dialogue with your peers, providing well-thought-out points instead of "shoot from the hip" answers. For example, if you agree, explain why. As a resource, I have provided a grading rubric as well as guidelines for posting in the discussion rubric.

Keep in mind that the perceptions of other members of the class toward you will be almost entirely driven by your postings; consider the perception that you want others to have of you. All your online communications should be composed with fairness, honesty and tact. Spelling and grammar are very important in an online course

Topic & References List – 6%

During Session 2, each student will issue an individual policy proposal topic from the social problems topics list in Canvas. You are free to select a topic that is not on the list, however it must be approved by the professor first so simply send a Canvas email for approval. This topic and reference list is for your final policy proposal paper (which is due in Session 7). Please submit an MS Word document containing your topic, a brief (i.e., approximately ½ page – no more than 1 page, Times New Roman, 12-point font

size, double spaced) description of the topic, any central points, and a brief list of at least 4 references/sources, written in APA style. The references must be from professional literature (i.e., from the library databases) and MUST be used and cited in your final policy proposal paper.... therefore, the reference list that you submit will be included in your final policy proposal paper list of references. This topic, brief description and 4 references submission is due on the second session/week of the course (i.e., Saturday, at 11:59pm).

Progress summary – 4%

During Session 5, each student will talk briefly with the instructor to discuss progress on the policy proposal. As part of the contact meeting, students should prepare a brief (i.e., approximately ½ page – Times New Roman, 12-point font size, double spaced) description of substantive work on their topic. The description does not need to be a separate, written summary of progress on the policy proposal. Rather, a copy of a rough draft of the proposal, an outline of the paper, a list of the major points/policy proposals of the paper (“cut and pasted” from the original document) would all serve as summaries of the student’s progress. The intent of this summary is not to have the student do additional work summarizing their progress, but to show the instructor what the student has accomplished to this point. You will be required to email your instructor to schedule a phone contact time to discuss your progress on your policy proposal.

Final written policy proposal – 25%

For the final policy proposal, you are to select a social problem, conduct a review of a social problem (including references to the literature, and to current policies in the field), and the development of 2-6 recommendations for continuance of, or changes in policy with regard to the social issue. The focus of the paper may be at an agency level (e.g., local agency policies & procedures, such as a non-profit food bank), a local (e.g., municipal or county) level, a state level, a national level, or at an international level. Be sure to consider the audience for your proposal in your writing. The focus and topic of the paper will be discussed with, and approved by the instructor.

The final proposal should be at least 8-10 pages in length (approximately 2400 – 3000 words), not including title page, abstract or executive summary, tables, graphs, references, and appendices. The proposal should be word processed, double-spaced, front side only, in Times New Roman 12-point font, and written in literate English, APA style.

The structure for the proposal should follow (you may use subheadings, if you wish):

Title page

Abstract/Executive summary

Main body of the paper (8-10 pages)

Background to the proposal (e.g., What is the current situation? What is the current policy? Why is it being conducted this way?)

Analysis (Why is the policy not working? Why is it necessary to find an alternative?)

Policy options (Discuss a few alternatives and their options)

Recommendations (Provide 2-6 recommendations, along with suggestions, and suggestions for implementing the recommendations)

Conclusion (summarize your analysis and recommendations)

References

Appendices (relevant tables, figures, maps, graphics)

For the policy proposal, you are expected to use at least 8 sources relevant to the topic of the paper; these sources may be professional literature, material from relevant websites (e.g., governmental websites, NPO websites, focused websites (that address a particular social problem), or other material, as long as the material is relevant to the topic. Be sure to include the four (4) you listed from your assignment "Topic & References List"

A rubric for marking the final paper may be found in Canvas.

Final Oral & PowerPoint Presentation – 10%

Students are expected to give a final oral presentation of their proposal. The presentation will be in the form of a recording that will be submitted to the instructor and for all students to see on the discussion board. Keep in mind that your goal in the presentation is to convince your colleagues of the merits of your proposal. The presentation should be approximately 10-12 minutes long. Please submit a PowerPoint that also explains your presentation with a minimum of 5 slides not including the title slide and reference slide. A grading rubric is included in the discussion submission area.

Attendance and Participation – 7%

Seven percent of your overall grade will be assigned for attendance and participation. Each unexcused absence will result in a reduction of 1 percent to your grade. Limited or marginal participation in discussions early will result in a half-percent reduction in grade. Completion of the quizzes, active and relevant participation in discussions, email and meeting dialog with professor, and assignment submissions are components of “attendance and participation”.
