Course Description: Foundations of World Civilizations presents a history of human civilization from its beginnings to the present. Emphasis is placed on the development of basic institutions, cultural achievements, and historical connections that help students understand the present and plan for the future.

Prerequisites: Successful completion of HIS 131 is a prerequisite for all students to graduate. History majors must receive a final grade of "C" or higher to earn course credit.

Course Objectives: This course will develop your skills in:

- —Listening and taking notes on a lecture
 - —Contributing opinions to class discussions
 - —Using technology to conduct basic historical research
 - —Reading and analyzing primary and secondary sources
 - —Analyzing the evolution of world cultures and societies
 - —Understanding the link between past and present civilizations

Students will fulfill the following objectives mandated by the Alabama State Department of Education as applied to history under Section 290-3-3-.22 History, (1) curriculum rule .04:

- —Demonstrate knowledge of:
- 1. The origin and historical development of contemporary United States, other Western, and non-Western cultures in a chronological and spatial setting.
- 2. The interrelationship of economic, political, social, psychological, and technological forces in the shaping of societies and cultures.
- 3. Historical themes concerning the origin and evolution of Western civilization, including evolution of political institutions, religious movements, and population displacement.
- 4. Historical themes concerning the origin and evolution of non-Western civilization, including patterns of social and political development, cultural diffusion, conflict, and cooperation.

UNITS

I. The Ancient Civilizations

Students will understand the origins of the world's major civilizations, the contributions of the civilizations to world history, and the influence of these civilizations on the modern world

II. Greece and Rome

Students will understand Greek and Roman civilization and the contributions of the Greeks and Romans to the modern world, particularly Western Civilization.

III. The Monotheistic Religions; Byzantium; Africa

Students will understand the similarities, differences, and major beliefs of the three major monotheistic religions; Judaism, Christianity, and Islam. Students will also understand the history, development, and contributions of Byzantium and Africa

IV. The Middle Ages

Students will understand the major events and figures from the period A.D. 500-1500, particularly focusing on Western Europe, religion, and the discovery of America

GRADING

EXAMS: You will have four exams. The exams will be essay-based exams submitted online via Canvas. Write as much detail as possible. Use ONLY your own knowledge on the subject and the textbook. DO NOT copy and paste (or any variance thereof) from websites.

RESEARCH PAPER: You will have one Identifications project. Use ONLY the textbook for this project. Write a FULL paragraph for each term. You MUST CITE the page number(s) from the textbook at the end of each paragraph in parentheses. 100 points

DISCUSSION: You will have four discussion assignments worth 100 points total. I will grade all discussions on a curve at the end of the semester. I will base grades on effort, content, thoughtfulness, and responses. There is NO makeup for discussions. This component considers attendance, attention to the class, participation, and thoughtfulness.
