

# **SYLLABUS**

**COURSE TITLE: MUS 231-D: Theory of Music III** 

**COURSE INSTRUCTOR:** Dr. Jeremey McMillan

**COURSE DESCRIPTION:** As a continuation of the 12-hour music theory curriculum, MUS 231 is a study of the diatonic principles of the masterworks of the Common Practice Era. Students explore voice-leading in triads and seventh chords, passing and neighboring functions of chords, principles of four-part writing, aural skills, and basic piano keyboard skills.

**COURSE OBJECTIVES:** MUS 231 applies the mechanics music to begin studying the underlying structure of the masterworks. This course seeks to give students the tools needed to accomplish this goal through the study and evaluation of:

Upon successful completion of MUA 231, the student will be able to:

- 1. Sing simple diatonic and pentatonic melodies at sight
- 2. Listen to simple melodies and fragments and identify the tonal center, scale degrees
- 3. Understand the interaction between at least two independent voices
- 4. Use the piano keyboard to visualize concepts introduced in lessons
- 5. Use technology to become independent learners.

#### **Teaching Methods and Resources:**

- The study of species counterpoint: As the first course of a comprehensive four-semester sequence, MUS 231 encourages students to explore analyze, and manipulate the mechanics of music composition and performance. The core of Theory I and II are mechanics, hence the emphasis on counterpoint. The core of Theory III is the aesthetics of music and skills for career readiness.
- 2. Student Collaboration and Leadership: Study groups are assigned based on the results of a musicianship exam given on the first day of class. Students with a stronger grasp of the prerequisites are paired with students who need remediation. These groups meet twice a week outside of class to collaborate on an analysis or a problem.
