Course Description:

Geo-Political Studies is designed to clarify public issues and invite public deliberation. This course is an introduction to the responsibilities of citizenship at the local, national, and international levels. Emphasis in the course is oriented toward understanding and making critical judgments on political and geopolitical issues from the local to the international arena.

Course Objectives:

- 2. Examine world politics from a historical perspective.
- 3. Explore policy objectives of states/power of states.
- 4. Discuss diplomacy and foreign policy decisions.
- 5. Explain the Just-War Theory and other principles of war.

- 6. Compare international cooperation with international terrorism.
- 7. Identify several twenty-first century views of global politics.
