Course Description

This course is concerned with effective communication of thought in speaking situations. It examines not only the basic discourse skills but provides attention to logical analysis of informative and persuasive discourse and actual practice through classroom speaking. Prerequisites: ENG 131-132 or ENG 199-200.

Speech Assignment Guidelines

Kommentar [NG1]: Everything from this point to the end of the document is optional—as in, you do not need to include the information about the speech guidelines if you do not prefer to have them on the course syllabus. I imagine the guidelines will be provided as part of the assignments that are communicated for students to complete.

Reading any speech other than the Great Speech Presentation will result in the grade of the speech beginning at the D- level and going down from there.

Speech 1 Personal Introduction

Tell the class the following information. Feel free to make extra comments about any of them.

Name

Where you are from

Maior

Job/Career

Age

What's your thing?

One thing the class would not know unless you told them

Grading Criteria - Get up and tell us all 7 things and you receive all of the points

Speech 2 Personal Narrative Artifact Speech

The purpose of this speech is to introduce you to speaking before an audience in a speaking situation with no pressure. This will give you an opportunity to build up your confidence, & also to practice eye contact, projection, & gestures.

Very simply, tell your audience about yourself. You should include standard biographical information &, if you like, more anecdotal material. You might include, for example, a story about your proudest moment, most embarrassing moment, etc. (remember this should be in addition to and not in place of the biographical material)

In addition, bring an artifact or item from your life. The artifact can come from any culture in which you have been involved or from any personal experience or achievement that you think helps define who you are.

Remember to speak loudly enough to be heard & slowly enough to be understood, appear confident & in control, & present your information in an organized way. DO NOT READ. Limit yourself to 2-3 minutes of speaking time.

Grading Criteria - Get up talk between 2 and 3 minutes and you receive all of the points

Speech 3 Speech of Tribute

This speech will give you experience with speaking on special occasions. Using your personal knowledge, give a speech about the "A Person I Admire". You should attempt to help us understand why we should join you in appreciating one person that you admire. Emphasize careful use of language & delivery skills. Remember to prepare & deliver a 3-4 minute speech. DO NOT READ

Grading Criteria – This primary focus in grading is sincerity and feeling, but it should have and into that catches the class attention and a conclusion that leaves us thinking. The use of stories

raises this speech to the highest level.

Speech 4 Take a Stand

This speech is intended as preparation for the final persuasive speech. Pick a topic. Take stand and give 3 reasons for the stand you took. This stand should be about an important topic. This speech should last 2-3 minutes. DO NOT READ.

Grading Criteria – An attention catching intro, a memorable conclusion, logical reasons and discussion of them are important, but feeling and passion raise this to the level of excellent.

Speech 5 The Coaching Speech

This speech will consist of you reading 1-2 pages of a great speech. While you are reading the speech to the class, you will receive verbal instructions on how to make it better. If you respond by doing the things I am asking you to do, you will receive all of the points for the speech. If you do not or if I feel that you still have room for improvement, I will ask you to come back on the second day and try it again.

Grading Criteria – Your response to my coaching cues during the speech are the deciding factor in receiving all of the points or being asked to try it again.

Speech 6 Great Speech Presentation

This speech will give you a chance to work on the delivery of the speech without having to research and develop a speech on your own. Simply pick one of the greatest speeches in world history and deliver it to the class. Remember that this speech should not come across and being read or recited from memory. The primary grading area of this speech will be on how you present the speech with an emphasis on giving the audience a sense of the emotions felt by the original audience within the context of the occasion on which it was given. This does not mean you should attempt to imitate the speaker who gave it, rather in your own style create for this audience a sense of the feeling felt by the audience on the occasion in which it was first presented. Also tell us who gave the speech, when and where it was given and for what purpose if it is a lesser known speech. This speech should last 3-4 minutes.

Grading Criteria – A good flown and some eye contact will get you a C. A good flow with vocal power and passion will get you a B. A good flow with power, passion and some eye contact will get you an A.

Speech 7 Persuasive Speech

This speech will give you experience with persuasive speaking. In this speech, you will apply everything you have learned about public speaking up to this point, as well as argumentation skills. Each speech should be adapted to your particular audience, organized with support for each claim & sub-claim in the speech, clearly & effectively reasoned, free of all logical fallacies & coercion, & extemporaneously delivered. The speech can be a:

- 1. Speech of Reason -- focus on reasons why an audience should accept your position on a particular issue. Example convince an audience that handgun control is not desirable.
- 2. Speech of Opposition oppose a belief that may be widely held among your audience. Carefully measure audience attitudes on the topic, then indicate, with sound reasoning & evidence, why their position is problematic. Example your audience may be against gun control. Your task is to convince them that handgun control legislation is desirable.
- 3. Speech of Action persuade the audience to take a specific appropriate action. The action should be workable & address the particular issue clearly. Example you may want to persuade the audience to support the United Farm Workers Union by boycotting grapes.

Remember:

Use all the delivery & organizational skills used in your speeches up to this point. Keep your speech to a time of 6-8 minutes.

Organize your arguments clearly & carefully, eliminating logical fallacies & coercion. Use a visual aid, this is required.

Use at least three credible sources, clearly identified in your speech.

Prepare a full sentence outline to be turned a week before the speech.

DO NOT READ.

Grading Criteria – An attention catching intro, a memorable conclusion, logical reasons and discussion of them are important. Bring in a good flow, some eye contact, vocal power and passion and you will receive an A.

Extra Activities Assignment Guidelines

Impromptu Speech

This speech will give you experience with speaking without preparation. Each speech should be adapted to your particular audience and impromptu. Using your personal knowledge, give a speech about whatever topic you are assigned. Remember to be ready to deliver a 1-2 minute speech.

Pet Peeves (What Makes Me Really Mad)

This speech should be about one thing that makes you angry enough to raise your voice to the level of shouting. You do not have to prepare proof or research to back up your opinions on this topic. Just get up and raise you voice the level of yelling at your audience at least once during the speech. This speech should last from 1-2 minutes.
