

COR245 Probation, Parole and Community Corrections (3 credit hours) Syllabus

Course Description

This course analyzes the history of corrections in the United States, the differences between probation and parole, supervision and re-entry. Topics include juvenile procedures, pre-sentence investigation, supervision, the use of community corrections in re-entry and how intermediate punishment is implemented. Students will develop a course project designed to cover the concepts explored in this course.

By the end of this course, the student will be able to do the following:

- 1. Compare the differences between probation and parole.
- 2. Discuss the evolution of corrections in the United States.
- 3. Identify key roles, and responsibilities of probation and parole officers in the criminal justice setting.
- 4. Analyze the effectiveness of probation and parole supervision and theories.
- 5. Examine options available to offenders through community corrections.
