COURSE DESCRIPTION: This course aims to provide an overview of the relevant areas of economics. After developing basic economic principles, such as the rationality assumption, the marginal benefit and marginal cost framework and demand and supply analysis, equal attention is devoted to the principles of microeconomics and macroeconomics. Areas of study include firm decisions under various market structures, the role of money, central bank, and interest rates in the economy, as well as differing views on how an economy grows.

- 1. Explain how individuals make choices using the framework of economics.
- 2. Analyze the impact of changing market conditions on the market using demand and supply analysis.
- 3. Discuss the determination of the production quantity and of the selling price by a firm under various market structures.
- 4. Apply the theory of the firm to specific circumstances faced by a company in a real market.
- 5. Evaluate the role of banks and the monetary system in a market economy.
- 6. Critique various views on the role of consumption, saving, investment, and government intervention regarding the business cycle and economic growth.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS
