

# **COURSE SYLLABUS**

COURSE TITLE: Philosophy of Religion TERM & YEAR: Fall

COURSE & SECTION NUMBER: PHL 323 TIME & PLACE: Internet asynchronous

**NUMBER OF CREDIT HOURS: 3** 

**COURSE DESCRIPTION:** An inquiry into the nature of religious experience, activity and belief. An examination of the concepts of God, freedom, and immortality, as well as the relationship of religious knowledge to artistic and scientific knowledge.

**LEARNING OUTCOMES:** The class objective is to explore the perennial questions in the philosophy of religion in a manner thought to be genuinely worthwhile. The lectures will be personal and yet critical, attempting to strikes a fair balance between pure neutrality on the one hand and outright advocacy on the other. Classroom discussion is encouraged. Upon completion of this course, the student should be able to do the following:

- A. Express an informed philosophic opinion about religious experience, faith and reason, and theistic arguments.
- B. Discuss the problem of evil
- C. Describe reformed epistemology, miracles, and religious language
- D. Explain religious pluralism, religion and science and the relationship between religion and morality.

**COURSE REQUIREMENTS:** Students will be required to participate in several activities, to complete certain reading and written assignments, to complete forum entries on Moodle, and to share ideas and experiences with the class in the forum discussions.

### ATTENDANCE/PARTICIPATION:

Trine University requires all students to attend classes to receive federal financial aid. Every week you must participate in class in some capacity (through a forum post at the minimum) to be counted in attendance. Attendance or the lack thereof will be reported to the university weekly.

Since this class has an online component, students need to log into the class and complete assignments. Makeup quizzes and acceptance of late assignments will be considered only for documented medical reasons or emergency circumstances and will be handled on a case by case basis.

## **GRADING/EVALUATION:**

All assignments must be completed satisfactorily in order to pass the course. The evaluation process described below is subject to change by the instructor. Changes will be announced in class. #### **OTHER POLICIES:**

#### ACADEMIC MISCONDUCT
