Catalog Description:

This course is an introduction to forensic science. Students will learn the basic applications of crime scene processing through laboratory techniques of identifying and examining physical evidence such as blood, DNA, firearms, and trace evidence. It will also consider the legal implications associated with such examinations and testifying as an expert witness about those theories, processes, and techniques.
