Course Outline: This course surveys major themes in the history from 1500 to the present. The main emphasis will be on the interaction between humans, their developing societies and the environment. The consequences of technology in relation to modernization, industrialization and human habitation form a central theme.

Course Objectives: At the end of this class, students should be able to recognize the importance of major landmarks of World History after 1500, and analyze and integrate historical knowledge. The Age of Exploration, development of Nation-States, Colonialism, Imperialism, Two World Wars, the Cold War, and the War on Terrorism should be recognized for their influence on today's world. Students should be able to analyze the World after 1500. In this manner, students will fulfill the university mission of becoming enlightened and aware citizens of the United States and the world.

Study Objectives/Expectations: This course is not self-paced, nor is it open-ended. There is a beginning and ending date as well as assigned deadlines for Assignments, Discussions, and Essay Exams. Our class will be taught in a somewhat informal lecture and discussion format. Open-ended discussion is highly encouraged and students are invited to ask questions or raise points for discussion at any time. All of our discussion and person-to-person contact will be done through the website to maintain the integrity of the learning process. Questions or comments regarding grades or other personal matters should be sent directly to: sarles@uiwtx.edu. This course is eight weeks long. We cannot possibly cover all aspects

of history in that short period of time. You will do most of your work off-line, but you will be expected to access the website area at least five out of the seven days per week to submit work, retrieve assignments, read lectures, take exams, and participate in posted group discussion. Participation is critical to your successful completion of this class and will have a major bearing on your final grade. Let me be clear that this does not mean you will not pass the course if you are on less than five days, but it makes it harder for you to complete the course because you will spend more time when you are on less often.

Professionalism: Your written work reflects your abilities to articulate your thoughts. Use acceptable spelling, grammar, presentation, and organization when writing your Assignments, Discussions, and Essay Exams. Be respectful of everyone in the class by always using academically appropriate language, especially in 'Discussion' when interacting with classmates. A good way to think of this is to treat these writings as though you are submitting them to your boss. Points will be deducted so make use of things like 'Spell-Check'. Please write and post work that is APA style.

Assignment Instructions

- 1. Look at "Part III Course Table'. In the center section 'Assignments' locate the proper week, read the questions, choose ONE.
- 2. Log on the Internet and find THREE college worthy sources that will help you answer the question. 'You Tube' and 'Khan Academy' have good videos. Do not use Wikipedia. You will lose 20 points.
- 3. Click 'Week One Media Links', click 'Week 1 Blog', click 'Week `1 Internet Source' click the 'Comment' button, pick the ONE source you like best of the three, type an imaginative title, post the entire Internet Source hyperlink, followed by a short comment describing that source. Do this BEFORE writing your Assignment. #5 below will explain why.

- 4. In an MSWord.docx, type the question, your answer, and paste the full web address (URL) of the source(s) in that order. Do a word count, spell check, proof read, and check your work against the Rubric.
- 5. Click "Week One Media Links', look through classmate's Internet sources. Choose the ONE you like best, then at the bottom of your Assignment, ID the student, URL, and write about WHY you liked that specific source. (Now do you see why you need to quickly post ONE Media Link?)
- 6. Click 'Week One Assessments', click 'Week One Assignment', click the 'Write Submission' button, paste your Assignment in the 'Submission' box, and click the 'Submit' button. (Similar process for Weeks 2-8)

Discussion Instructions

- I Initial Discussion
- 1. Look at 'Part III Course Table'. In the right hand section 'Discussion' locate the proper week. Click 'Week One Class Notes', open the link, and read until you find ONE item that interests you. (Similar process for Weeks 2-8.)
- 2. In an MSWord.docx write an 'Initial Discussion' explaining WHY that item was of 'Interest' includes but is not limited to positive, negative, surprise, confusion, etc.) Do a word count, spell check, proof read, and check your work against the Rubric.
- 3. Click 'Week One Discussion', click 'Week 1 Discussion Thread', click 'Reply', put an 'appropriate' title in the 'Subject' box, post your Initial Discussion in the 'Message' box, and click 'Submit'.
- II Three Replies
- 1. Open 'Week One Discussion', click 'Week 1 Discussion Thread', scroll down and read until you find a minimum of THREE 'Initial Discussions' from THREE classmates that you would like to 'Reply' to. Type your 'Three Replies' in an MSWord.docx, spell check, and proof read. (Write enough to earn a good grade.)
- 2. Open 'Week One Discussion', click 'Week 1 Discussion Thread', click the 'Reply' button located under each proper classmate posting, put an 'appropriate' title in the 'Subject' box, post your Reply in the 'Message' box, and click 'Submit'.

Midterm & Final Essay Exams Instructions

- 1. Your Midterm Essay Exam is cumulative over four weeks and is NOT posted until ALL required chapters are completed. (Same for Final Essay Exam.) Look at 'Part III Course Table'. In the left hand section 'Midterm & Final Essay Exams' locate the proper week and read the required chapters.
- 2. Select one or more things of 'Interest' from EACH and EVERY chapter. In an MSWord.docx write about WHY you found these things to be of interest. ('Interest' includes but is not limited to positive, negative, surprise, confusion, etc.) Label each chapter ("Chapter 1", etc.). Write a separate paragraph for each chapter.
- 3. Include exactly TEN APA style quotes. ALL 10 quotes must come from the required course e-book. They must be short and woven into the narrative to support your reasoning. They can be divided among

whichever chapters you choose. Do a word count of entire essay exam, spell check, proof read, and check your work against the Rubric.

- 4. Click 'Week Four Assessments', click 'Midterm Essay Exam', click the 'Write Submission' button, paste your Midterm Essay Exam in the 'Submission' box, and click the 'Submit' button. (Same process for Final Essay Exam in Week Seven)
- 5. Midterm Essay Exam Peer Review This Peer Review will not open until after the Midterm Essay Exam Due Date. As soon as it opens post your Midterm Essay Exam, HERE. Yes your Midterm Essay exam is already in 'Midterm Essay Exam' but classmates cannot see it. They can see it here. Anyone who does not post their Midterm Essay Exam here within 15 hours of this item opening will earn a zero for the Peer Review even if they do the actual review. You are not allowed to peer review classmates if you will not let them review you.
- 5a. Look through classmates 'Midterm Essay Exams' until you find something of interest that you wish to 'peer review'. Then choose ONE Item only from the Midterm Essay Exams of THREE different classmates. (THREE Items total.) ID the student, the chapter being reviewed, and type your review. Do same process with two more students.
- 5b. Type all THREE Peer Reviews in ONE MSWord.docx, do a word count, spell check, proof read, and check your work against the Rubric. Click 'Week Four Assessments', click 'Midterm Essay Exam Peer Review', click the 'Write Submission' button, paste your Peer Review in the 'Submission' box, and click the 'Submit' button.

This will give you a strong variety of required sources. This is to be your own work, completed by you and you alone. Do NOT do the same topic more than one time. If your Assignment was George Washington, find a new topic for your Discussion. If you do the same topic twice you will earn a zero for the Discussion.

Its purpose is for accreditation, so it is not something you must adhere to. I just did not want you to be confused when you see them.)
