Introduction and General Information:

This course and your text provides students with the knowledge and skills required to work with electronic health records (EHRs) in today's rapidly changing health care environment. The text is not intended as a source of in-depth training on a specific EHR software program, although students do have an opportunity for hands-on experience with a physician practice EHR. The text focuses on teaching students how the adoption of electronic health record affects them as future health care professionals. Whether planning a career as a medical assistant, a technician, a billing specialist, a medical coder, or as any other allied health professional, students need to know why EHRs are important, how they are used, and the advantages they offer to providers, facilities, and patients.

Please plan on reading the ANNOUNCEMENTS area a couple of times a week. Each week may have a general announcement to start, but if I have anything that you all need to know comes up, I will post it there.

Make sure to read this COURSE OUTLINE carefully. It has answers to a many of your questions. Print it for future reference. However, weekly assignments can change so always look at Blackboard for the week's assignments and due dates. These will be posted each Sunday night.

Study Objectives/Expectations:

This online course is not self-paced, nor is it open-ended. There is a beginning and ending date for each course, and assigned deadlines for homework, reading, quizzes, and on-line discussion. Our online class will be taught in a somewhat informal lecture and discussion format. Open-ended discussion is highly encouraged and students are invited to ask questions or raise points for discussion at any time. All of our discussion and person-to-person contact will be done through the website to maintain the integrity of the learning process. Questions or comments regarding grades or other personal matters should be sent directly to me.

This course is eight weeks long. We cannot possibly cover all aspects of this course in that short period of time. You will do most of your work off-line, but you will be expected to access the website area at least five out of the seven days per week to submit work, retrieve assignments, read, and participate in posted group discussion. Participation is critical to your successful completion of this class and will have a major bearing on your final grade. Let me be clear that this does

not mean you will not pass the course if you are on less than five days, but it makes it harder for you to complete the course because you will spend more time when you are on less often.

Finally, you cannot learn scientific concepts unless you practice them regularly. There will be weekly homework assignments. Discussion will also be based around the concepts in order for all of the students in the class to support each other in learning the course material.

Professionalism:

Your assignments reflect your abilities to articulate your thoughts in writing. Be mindful of your spelling, presentation and organizational skills when writing in discussion and completing your assignments. A good way to think of this is to treat each assignment as though you are submitting it to your boss. All homework papers and your Service Learning Project will be completed in APA format. In Blackboard you will find a sample perfect paper, links to the APA website and links to the UIW Online Writing Center. Please use all of these resources.

Lectures:

At the beginning of each week (Monday), there will be a lecture link(s) and PowerPoint Presentations posted in the Media Links section if applicable. It will be on the subject(s) we are studying for that week. I may also include a variety of resources in the in this area of the class. Do not hesitate to ask questions as we work through the material. I am here to help.

Homework (15 % of final grade):

The due date for all homework is midnight (CST) on Saturday of the week. (The term "week" used in the syllabus/outline refers to the span of seven days from Monday to Sunday.) All homework must be turned in by the designated due date or a grade of Zero (0) will be issued. If you foresee a problem, or have trouble with the software, need help, etc., notify me as soon as possible before the deadline. If you encounter any other problems with meeting a given deadline, contact me and I will evaluate your situation on an individual basis. I understand you are all Adult learners with busy lives. However, this is an 8-week semester and it moves quickly.

Journal Article Review/Blog/SLP Update (20% of final grade):

For the first four weeks of the course you will be required to post a blog to the discussion area. The blogs are your own comments concerning an article you read pertaining to the week's topic(s). Students are encouraged to read each other's blogs throughout the week. Your blog post must be submitted NLT midnight (CST) on Friday of each week. The blog must be a minimum of 150 words in length. Make this fun and enjoyable to read. This is your free expression about the article and the week's topic.

From week's five through seven, you will upload an update on the progress of your SLP. The update must be posted NLT midnight (CST) on Friday of the week. The upload must be a minimum of 150 words in length.

Finally, on week eight, you will post a blog on what you learned in this class. The upload must be a minimum of 150 words in length.

Each of the blog and SLP updates will be worth 100 points.

Mid Term Exam (10% of final grade):

At the end of week 4 there will be a midterm exam covering the first half of the semester.

Graded Discussion/Weekly Admission Ticket (30% of final grade):

Interacting is an important part of the online learning environment. Each week we will have a discussion topic related to our weekly course material and a weekly admission ticket. Each week you will post to the discussion board what topic you found the most interesting and the most difficult from the previous week. You will also tell us why. You will be required to post your initial posts NLT midnight (CST) on Tuesday and throughout the semester I will tell you how many responses to your classmates' posts you will require. The responses must be posted NLT midnight (CST) on Thursday. The discussion area is our "classroom" conversation. Your participation is very important unless you want to make a minimum grade. Your discussion posts should be respectful and substantive. The initial post is worth 50 points and the subsequent posts are worth 50 points for a total of 100 points for the week. REMEMBER, minimum work receives a minimum grade. No points will be given for missing the deadlines for submission. This would be like you never interacted in the classroom discussion.

Service Learning Project (25% of final grade):

This semester you will be required to complete a service-learning project (SLP) specifically related to Electronic Health Records. The objectives of the course have been designed to provide you the knowledge and skills to be successful in this area of the health care industry. This will require you to go into the community and observe/interact/interview activities and professionals/public officials related to healthcare and public health.

Definition

Service-learning is a structured learning experience that combines community service with preparation and reflection. Students engaged in service-learning provide community service in response to community-identified concerns and learn about the context in which service is provided, the connection between their service and their academic coursework, and their roles as citizens.

Project Guidelines

The following guidelines will be followed when completing your SLP:

- Submit SLP for instructor approval NLT Friday of the fourth week of the semester.
- Starting in week 5 of the semester, you will need to submit weekly SLP updates, more to follow on format.
- SLP will be due NLT midnight (CST) Thursday of the last week of the semester.
- You must use APA format when submitting your SLP paper. Utilize the grading rubric and example of a perfect paper given for your case study to make sure that you get as many points as you can. The minimum length is 750 words. More than 1,000 words are too much.
- Your SLP paper must include the following:
 - Establishment of your learning outcome(s) as a result of the SLP. In other words, what did you expect to get out of the SLP you chose?
 - o The mechanics of how the SLP was conducted
 - Summary of community relationships as a result of your SLP
 - o How did the established learning outcomes effect you personally
