Course Description: This course will provide an overview of the discipline of Organizational Behavior (OB), The ethics and values of the O.D. professional and self-assessment will be an integrative theme and experience during the semester.

Course Objectives/Outcomes/Assessments

- 1. To understand the genesis and evolution of OB.
- 2. To understand OB professional values and ethics
- 3. To introduce the student to a variety of OB topics and issues, and to illustrate the applicability and use of OB theories and concepts.
- 4. Through the use of discussion, application exercises, and the case study method illustrate to the student how understanding OB is essential to managerial and organizational success.
- 5. Develop systems thinking skills
- 6. Develop written communication skills
- 7. Develop capabilities for critical thinking, reflection and planned application of course content.

Course Assignments will include weekly discussion questions that you initially post, your response(s) to other students and a Final Exam & Reflection on the course.

"A" and "A-" — indicate a superior grasp of the subject matter of the course, initiative and originality in assessing problems and ability to relate knowledge to new situations. "B+" and "B" indicate satisfactory performance in control of the subject matter and ability to apply principles with intelligence. 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COURSE DELIVERABLES AND EXPECTATIONS

The **Weekly Lessons Folder** in Blackboard contains folders for Week One – Week Eight. Each Weekly Folder contains four subfolders:

- The <u>Class Notes</u> folder contains <u>PowerPoint</u> slides for that week's chapters and may also contain <u>Lecture Notes</u>. Videos (YouTube) are almost always contained in the PowerPoint slides at the place it is desirable to view them.
- The **Media Links** folder may contain videos selected to enhance your understanding of the assigned chapters for that week. Most or all will be in the PowerPoint Slides.
- The Assessment folder will NOT be used in this course. Sometimes guizzes or case studies are included here.
- The Discussion folder will contain weekly questions, or threads that require your response. See details below.

Weekly Discussion Questions(s).

Discussions will be posted at the beginning of each week. Each student will be expected to research, read, and share facts and/or their opinions – depending on the nature of the questions. Discussion closes for any given week at 9AM on Monday. Discussions are two parts, part 1 is due by Wednesday midnight; part 2 is due by Monday, 9AM. Part 1 (Monday - Wednesday) is your independent, original response to the discussion question. Your discussion remarks reflect your ability to articulate your thoughts in writing. Be mindful of your spelling, presentation and organizational skills when writing. Your discussions and assignments should be done as if they were to be given to an executive for review. An overview of requirements:

- Each post may be up to 300+ words. Everyone must post by Wednesday at 11:59 PM.
- An 'original' response (answer to question posted by professor) accounts for 60% of the Discussion Grade for that week

Part 2 (Thursday 12:01AM – Monday 9AM) is your response, reaction, critique, comments or analysis of original posts by other students from (Monday – Wednesday). Obviously 'me too', 'I agree', etc. types of responses don't count toward total input. Be thorough, insightful, and respectful, elaborate on what others wrote, and be sure that it is tied to the specific theories and concepts from that week, or tied to other weeks, and perhaps to your experiences.

- You must reply to a minimum **ONE student**. Replying to more students is encouraged and earn a better grade if the quality merits it. Your post (response) to each student may be up to 150 + words.
- This response to a classmate accounts for 30% of the Discussion Grade for that week.
- Your organization, clarity of writing, use of grammar, and timeliness account for 10% of the total, weekly grade.

For Both Parts 1 and 2:

- Support your contributions with in depth analysis, facts and references.
- Provide informative, substantive, and well thought-out input. Use examples as appropriate.
- Use appropriate language and Netiquitte.
- DO NOT CUT AND PASTE from external sources or from the work of others without analysis and citations and.
- Please stay on track, learning with and from each other is essential.

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Discussion does not mean answering the question without analyzing the information. Analysis is a detailed examination of a topic, it is the process of separating something into different parts and analyzing each of the parts; it involves investigation, study, scrutiny, exploration, and interpretation. Discussion is a large percentage of your final grade; failure to respond to discussions <u>WILL</u> have a serious impact on your grade and success of passing the course. Discussion closes for any given week at 9AMmidnight Central on Sunday of each week. Late responses (not posted as scheduled – Mon – Wed / Thurs - Sun) will <u>NOT RECEIVE CREDIT</u>.

Partial answers will earn you partial credit.

Study Objectives/Expectations. The approach in this course is based on textbook study, homework assignments, and meeting cooperative learning requirements. Learning objectives are spelled-out at the beginning of each weekly lesson/tutorial, in the form of lecture notes, PPT's, questions, case studies, etc.. The important thing is that you work along with the book for your own benefit - not just because they might be collected for grading purpose. Regular participation is required in the form of discussion participation and weekly requirements.

On line courses are not self-paced, nor are they open-ended. There is a beginning and ending date for each course with assigned deadlines for homework, reading, quizzes, and on-line discussion. This on-line class will be taught in a somewhat informal lecture and discussion format. All of the discussion and person-to-person contact will be done through BLACKBOARD to maintain the integrity of the learning process. Questions or comments regarding grades or other personal matters should be sent directly to the professor.

This course is eight weeks long. You will do most of your work off-line, but you will be expected to access Blackboard a minimum of five out of the seven days per week to submit work, retrieve assignments, read lectures, and participate in posted group discussion. This participation is critical to your successful completion of this class and will have a major bearing on your final grade. Be clear that this does not mean you will not pass the course if you are on less than five days but it makes it more difficult for you to complete the course because you will spend more time on course work when you log into BLACKBOARD less often.

The due date for all homework is each MONDAY by 9AM CENTRAL TIME, with the exception of week 8 where assignments are to be turned in by a designated due date, WEDNESDAY at MIDNIGHT. All homework must be turned in by the designated due date. If you foresee a problem, or have trouble with an assignment, need help, etc., notify me as soon as possible before the deadline. If you encounter any other problems with meeting a given deadline, contact me and I will evaluate your situation on an individual basis.

NO LATE WORK WILL BE ACCEPTED.

If I agree that materials can be submitted late, <u>a letter grade reduction - prior to grading - will be imposed (10 points).</u> Materials submitted after a 'due' date with no notification and agreement will be assigned a grade of zero (0).

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Participation, Punctuality and Attendance: Requirements and Expectations

- participation in Virtual courses is expected at least three out of seven separate days.
- Participation in Hybrid courses is expected in class, and two out of seven separate days.
- Eating and Smoking: NOT ALLOWED in class

Regular attendance (or on-line interaction) is essential for success in this class. Classes will start on time and you should arrive (log-in) promptly and prepared to participate fully for the entirety of the class
