COURSE DESCRIPTION

The first course in a year-long sequence introducing the elements of Classical Latin morphology, syntax and vocabulary. Students read portions of Cicero, Horace and other Latin authors.

Credits: 4

COURSE OUTCOMES

At the end of this course, a successful student will be able to

- CO-1. Decline Latin nouns of the first four declensions.
- CO-2. Conjugate Latin verbs of all four conjugations in the active indicative and the first two conjugations in the passive indicative mood, as well all four types in the infinitives, and in the imperative mood.
- CO-3. Translate various uses of the Latin nominative, genitive, dative, ablative and accusative cases.
- CO-4. Explain important aspects of Latin syntax
- CO-5. Make use of significant Latin vocabulary chosen from the most commonly used words.
- CO-6. Explain important aspects of the history of Latin literature and something of the work and individual characteristics of some of the most famous Latin authors.

Course Format

Everything you need to successfully complete this course in fifteen weeks is explained on the Course Site. Classical Latin 1 is broken down into 15 lessons. When you study, be sure to follow the suggested format explained for each lesson.

Weekly learning activities are organized by things to READ and VIEW, REVIEW and APPLY. By following the recommended learning sequence, you will be able to easily interact with the course materials and accomplish the intended learning outcomes.

Read and View - Gain the Knowledge

Each lesson will include required readings from the textbook(s) or Instructor Notes. There will also be a short video that covers the main material of each lesson.

Review - Memorize the Knowledge

Each lesson includes optional Chapter Reading guides (which review the content of the lesson videos) as well as study aids, such as vocabulary drills and grammar drills. While these are optional, it is imperative that you review vocabulary and grammar on a daily basis; these tools should be an excellent addition to your arsenal.

Apply - Use the Knowledge

Each lesson includes learning activities designed for interacting with what you've read and viewed, as well as interacting with other participants in the course. The lesson will conclude with certain assignments or assessments to submit.

Required Reading

Part of your coursework will involve assigned readings from the class textbook, Wheelock's Latin. You will be required to read each chapter carefully with the help of the Reading Guide questions to draw your attention to important concepts in each chapter. Although failure to complete the readings will not directly affect your grade for the course, it will be reflected in the quality of your work in the other areas below. Video lessons are provided as very helpful tools in understanding the textbook.

Translation Assignments

You will be assigned a set of weekly translation exercises found in each chapter of Wheelock's Latin. Most of these will involve translation from Latin to English, but a few will be from English to Latin. These exercises should be typed and submitted on the course site. Your work will be graded based on the translation of each word, overall sentence structure, and adherence to English grammar.

Weekly Quizzes

In addition, you will have 15-minute timed weekly grammar and vocabulary quizzes that will test your knowledge of the new material for that week. These quizzes are brief assessments to gauge how well you've understood the new material and, most of all, to encourage you to be diligent with memorization. The lowest quiz grade will be dropped.

Exams or Projects

The exams in this course are closed-book exams and need to be completed through the online course site. You may not use any notes, course textbook(s), video(s), and other course materials, nor have assistance by any person in completing the exams. As an alternative to taking the exams, you may choose instead to complete a Midterm or Final project as described below. Further details will be provided on the course site.

a) Take Midterm Exam after completing chapter 12 during week 8. This exam will test your knowledge of the grammar, vocabulary, and syntax from chapters 1-12. There is a 90 minute time limit.

OR

Complete Midterm Project which will involve a translation and grammatical analysis of an extended passage of Latin prose and an English to Latin translation passage.

b) Take Final Exam after completing chapter 22 during week 15. This exam will test your knowledge of the grammar, vocabulary, and syntax from chapters 1-22 with an emphasis on the second half of the semester. There is a 90 minute time limit.

OR

Complete Final Project which will involve a translation and grammatical analysis of an extended passage of Latin prose and an English to Latin translation passage.

Discussion Forums

Each week, you will have the opportunity to participate in a brief online activity that will require you to interact with other students taking the course in discussion forums. Further details for each activity will be posted on the course site. You will be graded based on the thoroughness of your participation (e.g. appropriate length of post, response to others, proper grammar, etc.). See the discussion forum rubric on the course site for further detail about how you will be graded.

COURSE SCHEDULE

Format

Everything needed to successfully complete this course in fifteen weeks is explained on the course site. Each assignment has been designed to work together during each week. When studying, be sure to follow the suggested format explained for each lesson.

For this course, students will receive access to each week's work as the semester progresses. There will be due dates during the week, but most weekly assignments will be due by 11:59 p.m. on Friday. Please refer to the schedule for the due dates of assignments.

Generally, for college-level work, students should expect to have an average of 9.5 hours of homework per week.
